From the Principal

Unley High School has completed a really productive Term 1. Some shared celebrations and recent events are outlined in this newsletter. We launched the colourful 2016 Year book (available from Student Services), took part in Head of the River and ran Year 8 to 12 Acquaintance Nights, Year 8 Swimming Carnival, Sports Day and interschool swimming and athletics competitions. Unley High sent representatives to important community events like the anniversary of the Apology to the Stolen Generations breakfast, Harmony Day and the International Women's Day celebration. Senior students joined in promoting the Meningococcal B vaccine trial in SA, and their Year 12 Formal was a great night and a chance to forget study for one evening. The detail put into the organization by the Student Committee and Year 12 Manager Alice Paterson is to be commended. The Hilton venue looked magnificent. The many staff who attended are to be thanked for their contributions to the success of the event.

After a term's work in Years 8 to 12 subjects, the first written reports are available for students and parents. Reading all Year 9 reports recently, it is pleasing to see that the majority of students are working productively both in class and on assignments during out of class time. Parent Teacher interviews are scheduled for the third week of Term 2, providing a direct avenue to discuss ways forward and to reaffirm the partnership between home and school. This partnership is a vital support in the lives of our young people. While teachers look forward to catching up with parents and students from all year levels at the Interviews, we encourage parents to continue to contact us on any matters as they arise.

Our school was commended in many areas by a DECD review team recently. We received the maximum four year return cycle and the final report will be published on the website when available. In Staffing news Rob Perkins has been seconded to the DECD Learning Improvement team for 6 months on a Gifted Education project. Toby Watts takes on the Assistant Principal Middle School role and Greg Waldeck is VET/ Career Development Coordinator. Deb Green takes up the Female Counsellor Coordinator role.

We had an overwhelming response to our recent Open Evening and it was a pleasure to see our students so proudly and competently show our potential families around to meet teachers and current students, and see working displays. The Principal's tour in the following week saw our largest turnout ever.

Year 9 students undertake NAPLAN tests in the second week of next term. These tests provide teachers with useful data on each student's reading, writing, spelling, grammar and numeracy. We use this along with subject grades to form a comprehensive picture of individual progress and to highlight any areas for improvement. Analysis of NAPLAN data is proving increasingly important in the area of planning for educational success.

Progress is continuing on our STEM Works project, with a recent Design Start Up meeting held at our school. Discussion focussed on fine tuning our project design and establishing project administration procedures, such as safety protocols.

Also, importantly, it allowed school leadership to be introduced to key personnel working on the project. This included departmental representatives, along with the project's architect and key engineers. Our STEM Works project has a budget of \$2.5M which will be used to develop an integrated Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths facility. It is anticipated that the concept phase will take six weeks to complete. This process includes engaging engineers and developing a more detailed report to set out an indicative building program and to inform the procurement strategy. It is anticipated that builders will be engaged from mid-year subject to the complexity of the project. Best wishes for a well-deserved and safe holiday break.

Introducing our new Deputy Principal

We welcome Mr Greg Rolton our new Deputy Principal, who replaces Ms Joanne Costa. Greg began his teaching career in Whyalla and his most recent appointment was at Aberfoyle Park High School where he spent 5 years as the Deputy Principal. His main teaching areas were in the Sciences (Chemistry and Geology) and Physical Education.

At Unley High School one of Greg's responsibilities is to co-lead the Curriculum Committee with Ms Harris, Principal. He has come from a school, which, like Unley High School, has a structure of professional development for teachers called PLCs (professional learning communities). He is looking forward to working with teams to help in 'taking the next step towards improving outcomes for students'.



Greg's other responsibilities include staffing; the oversight of Year 10 students with Mr Martin Ellis; and the new building project for STEM (Science, Technology Engineering and Maths).

Greg likes to keep fit by rowing and riding. Aside from keeping him fit, these activities are the preparation for his main interest, which is climbing. 'In Australia it's rock climbing, in Europe it's mountain climbing, up to 4000 feet."

With his wife Gillian Rolton (the Olympic equestrian champion who won gold medals in 1992 and 1996), Greg runs a program for equestrian riders. These young people become part of the Rolton household for up to 18 months, bringing their own horses for training.

Of his work at Unley High School he says, "I'm looking forward to taking the curriculum further, working with teaching teams, so that we can continue to improve outcomes for students. Unley High School is a high performing school and with the students we have, there is no reason we can't move students forward even more".

English News

WordFlyers arrives at Unley High School. This year, Unley High School has subscribed Years 8, 9 and 10 students to an online literacy program called WordFlyers. This interactive English program is designed to build students' essential literacy and higher-order thinking skills. To access WordFlyers at home on desktops, laptops and tablets, simply visit www.wordflyers.com.au and click on 'Student' to log in. Your child has their own unique login and password to access WordFlyers at home. They received this from their English or EAL teacher. Please feel free to browse the site with your child as it will be used in English and EAL classes during



this year. Mastering and continuing to work on literacy skills such as spelling, grammar and punctuation is an essential part of doing well at school, further study and work. To get the most out of your child's WordFlyers subscription, we recommend they use the website at home for at least 30 minutes each week.

If you find that your child is struggling with basic grammar, punctuation, comprehension and spelling skills, the website includes a Review level where students can quickly learn skills they may have missed in earlier years of schooling. Is it receive or recieve? Do I use complement or compliment? Is it the dog's bone or the dogs' bone? WordFlyers explains the rules and provides plenty of practice for students to learn essential literacy skills that are a feature of the Australian Curriculum: English.

In the lead-up to the May NAPLAN literacy tests, Unley students can use their WordFlyers subscription to familiarise themselves with the Language Conventions and Reading test formats. Each of the 128 units on WordFlyers has two lessons in the same format as the NAPLAN tests, on topics including grammar, spelling, punctuation and reading comprehension. Your child can easily find the NAPLAN*-style tests on the navigation bar. Using WordFlyers www.wordflyers.com.au for just 30 minutes a week will help your child to gain better literacy skills which will aid in their success across the curriculum.



Debating 2017

This year we have three teams in the Debating SA competition and they will begin the competition in week 2 of Term 2. The Year 8 Blue team consists of Jingle Lim, Charisse Teoh, Anthony Tsecagias, Rishabh Vasisht and Leia Vlahos. I will be coaching this team and their first debate will be on May 9 at Pembroke School where they will be asked to argue that fines for truancy should be increased. They will debate against St. John's Grammar School.

The Year 9 Blue team are coached this year by two of our most successful debaters from last year's Year 12s, Isaac Thiele-Swift and Jack Cheshire who are keen to pass on their

knowledge and skill to our middle school students. The team consists of Maeve Allen-Horvat, Deanna Athanasos, Nate Campbell, Steph Madigan and Caleb Mulholland. Their first debate will be on May 9 also at Pembroke and they will have to convince the adjudicator that doctors, nurses and midwives who promote anti vaccination messages should not be prosecuted. Science News

On Thursday 9 March, Year 12 Chemistry students journeyed to Flinders University to gain insight into our chromatography topic and take advantage of the advanced resources available at Finders University. Students undertook a series of experiments involving assessing components of liquids in a glow stick, grape Kool-Aid and different forms of solutions. We were able to watch an atomic absorption spectrometer in action This was quite exciting because of the flame it emits. One of the main highlights was getting to smell all the different types of

solutions that are considered 'faults' in wine-making due to their impurities. This included a clear liquid that apparently smelt like a horse. I can confirm it definitely did, and for some reason, everyone was quite captivated by its scent! At first, we were somewhat intimidated by the vast lab, but soon everyone got involved and took away a wealth of information from the trip. This excursion provided us with a valuable experience outside of the classroom. As we were able to gain a greater understanding of the highly technical equipment used within chromatography. The experiments made useful practical connections that aided our overall understanding of the chromatography topic and helped us significantly.

Guangdong Teacher Visit

Between 27 February and 3 March, Unley High School participated in the Guangdong Secondary School Teachers Training Program. A group of 20 teachers from Guangdong Province in China work shadowed staff in 5 secondary schools in Adelaide to learn about the South Australian education system and pedagogy.

Unley High School hosted five of these teachers who work shadowed our teachers in the areas of Science, Maths, Physical Education, Technical Studies and English. One of the Chinese teachers was a PE Specialist teacher and also the Principal in a school that teaches Chinese Martial Arts as part of the curriculum. Another teacher came from a school with an enrolment of 7000 students where the average class size is between 60 to 70 students.

The Chinese teachers said they felt privileged to work with experienced teachers and engaged students at Unley High School. They were impressed by school management processes and the knowledge and professionalism of staff and their classroom management skills. They expressed their thanks for the care and attention they were shown at Unley High School, the generous way questions were answered and the passion they saw in our teaching. They were very surprised by the high level of independent learning skills of Unley High School students in all year levels they observed. It was interesting to learn from them that their school district in China is trying to introduce more independent and self-directed learning but pressures of course completion and class sizes currently hinder their progress in this.

Teachers from Unley who participated in the visit reported that it was an interesting and enjoyable experience with one teacher commenting, "It was so pleasing to see our visitors expressions and interest in what we do as educators and their final comments showed that we do so much, so well at Unley."

"Last year the Senior Girls First Four broke a long drought by being the first Unley High School girls' crew to win a Head of the River event in sixteen years. And girls, today we continued that legacy by backing up last year's win with a convincing victory, again in the Four."

"Never stop raising your voice and speaking up for what is important to you. There is a saying that goes - Only when you are getting sick of giving the message that others are just starting to listen".

"Where you see opportunities in life, seize them and run with them, because you never know where they may take you"

"Never be afraid to show passion, anger, sadness for things that happen in your life. But more importantly, learn to channel the emotion into the energy you can use to actually do something about what has upset you in the first place."

"Wear what makes you comfortable, what gives you confidence, and don't let other people put you down because of it."

Australian Air Force Cadets - Unley Squadron

During first term Australian Air Force Cadets from 617 Squadron Unley High School attended the year 8 camps at Aldinga to coordinate some evening activities for students. Activities included erecting 3 by 3 metre tents, obstacle courses and when the weather became inclement one night, they demonstrated how to apply camouflage paint and use hand signals to send Chinese whispers down the line.







These are some examples of how The Australian Air Force Cadets (AAFC) provides opportunities for self-development within a structured environment. 617 Squadron at Unley High School parades on a Monday night from 6:15pm until 9pm in the 500 block buildings. The squadron recruits cadets from the ages of 13-20, who take part in many activities ranging from theory classes where they learn survival skills, aircraft recognition, aviation theory, to practical classes focusing on personal reliance. The squadron is developing a flight simulator course to enhance cadets' flight training. Cadets have opportunities to take part in activities ranging from weekend field exercises, promotion courses based at the Edinburgh Air Force Base, international exchanges and flying lessons in both gliders and powered aircraft. The squadron actively promotes awards such as the Duke of Edinburgh Award, of which last year they awarded 5 gold awards, 4 silver awards and 5 bronze awards. Many recipients are from Unley High School. These awards attract SACE points. As cadets progress through the training program they become eligible for SACE points for the advanced courses. Last year the squadron distinguished itself with the number of flying scholarships awarded to cadets. The squadron also supports community events such as the ANZAC Dawn service and Remembrance Day ceremony at Unley High School along with regular formal dining evenings.

On 3 March 2017 I flew to Sydney with a group of about 30 kayakers from West Lakes, Onkaparinga and Holdfast Bay Canoe Clubs to take part in the National Championships, held between 5-9 March. I have only been kayaking for just over a year after being selected by the South Australian Sports Institute (SASI) in November 2015. This was after SASI testers held a test for all year 8s at school, after which I was invited to attend two further selection tests over a few months. The tests are held to identify suitable candidates to take up sports such as cycling, volleyball and kayaking. They covered a number of fitness tests, as well as weight and height measurements. I was tested initially for cycling, but ended up being selected for kayaking, even though I had never been in a kayak before I started training. I



joined Holdfast Bay Club in January 2016, and I usually manage to train twice a week, but I try to increase to four times a week when the rowing season has finished. I have competed in a number of regattas at West Lakes over the season and was offered the opportunity to compete at the Nationals which I was really keen to do. We competed against other clubs from all over Australia, and I raced in the K4 with three boys I didn't know. I also competed in the K1, and raced in various distances from 200m to 1000m. The competition was held over four days, but we got a bit of down time to make friends and to relax. Although I didn't win any medals, I achieved personal best times in the 200m and 500m despite being very nervous. Kayaking is a sport where the peak age is around 28 years, so I have plenty of time to improve! It was a great event to be part of. I got to watch some really great racers, and to volunteer to hold two Olympians' boats at the start of their races. The facilities at Penrith are fabulous, and were used in the 2000 Olympics. The water there is much calmer than racing at West Lakes. I've now got a few weeks off before I start training again in May.

Materials and Service Charge 2017

The approved Materials and Service Charge for 2017 and subject fees, VET fees and Rowing fees need to be paid or have arrangements made for payment by the start of Term two. At this time many families owe fees for 2017 and previous years and it is essential these amounts are finalised or arrangements made to complete payment of outstanding amounts.

Your attention to either payment of the fees, completion of a 'Commitment to Pay' form and/or Direct Payment by Deposit form from the Finance Office would be appreciated. If you think you may be eligible for School Card, forms are available from Students Services and the School Card application can also be downloaded from www.decd.sa.gov.au.

Methods of payment include payment at the Finance Office between 8.00 am and 3.30 pm each day, payments on-line via the website or Direct Debit Deposits via bank account or credit card.

Direct Debit by Instalment has proven to be a successful option for payment of fees. Parents set an amount to pay weekly, fortnightly or monthly and specify the number of payments and payments are processed by finance staff against amounts outstanding.

If you have completed a 'Commitment to Pay' form you need to abide by the arrangements made on that form for payment of fees. If no arrangements are made then outstanding accounts will be forwarded to the Debt Collector by the end of Term Two.If you wish to discuss any arrangements please contact the school and speak to the Business Manager or Finance Officer on 8394 5400.
