Dear Parents/Caregivers

Welcome to the first newsletter of 2018. Starting my fourth year at Unley High School, I am very optimistic about the developments this year holds. What gives me most cause for optimism is the great bunch of people who make up this school community. Recently, one such person, former Head Prefect Nic Danell talked with the assembled school about leadership. We were inducting the Student Voice group for this year, and welcoming our large group of Year 8s. Nic drew on personal experience, and in summarising his most compelling point, he said, the

'trait noticed in the best leaders is that they reflect on their past mistakes'. He outlined the principle 'that the only way to improve is to study and draw meaning from the past, using it as an empowering life lesson'. Nic was able to

convey a thoughtful message in an enjoyable speech, and he also reminded us all of the achievements of our latest group of graduates. These Year 12 graduates certainly displayed excellence in their outstanding results. We recognise each student's individual effort combined with the positive input of their families and teachers. Over 72% of the grades achieved were A and B's. This is an excellent result and it is the third year in a row of percentage increase. Among personal achievements were those of students who were awarded an A+ with Merit at the Government House Ceremony in February. They are fine ambassadors for our School and well prepared for their various undergraduate university courses.



Our 2018 students are already actively contributing to school and community life, and the extra-curricular events outlined in this newsletter. For example, students are involved in the SACE Art Show, the Sports Summit, in public speaking and in Peer Support roles. Parents are making important contributions to the school as well. Student leaders participated in the annual Induction Day at Mitcham Community Centre. The day was full of "getting to know you" activities, guest speakers who talked about the importance of leadership and how to get things done, including Grace Lo Basso (former head



prefect), Ms Harris and Mr Marino. The afternoon was spent in year level groups, where there was a lot of passionate discussion about what the students thought were the issues in the school that they could have an impact on and planning their goals for this year. The leaders also had the opportunity to sign up for the various committees that Unley High School has, so that students can have a voice about sport, canteen, uniform and facilities.

Lions Youth of the Year Quest

This year Unley High School was represented in this competition by Henry Thiele-Swift. The competition seeks to give young people [15- 18 year olds] experience in leadership, personal improvement, sportsmanship, citizenship and public speaking in order to improve their skills before entering the workforce. Students take part in an interview and a public speaking component and Henry was one of six entrants from both private and state schools in the Mitcham area. Winners of the Club level can proceed to Zone, Region, District, State and then the National final. The interview took place on Sunday 11 February at the Mitcham Council Chambers and lasted for 30 minutes. The judges were the City of Mitcham Mayor, Mr Glenn Spear and Dr Michelle Wirthensohn the Manager of the Australian Almond Breeding Program. Students can gain up to 80 points in the interview and then proceed to the public speaking component worth 30 points. The public speaking component took place at a dinner at the Edinburgh Hotel and students could invite their family and teachers to the event. It consists of a



prepared speech [15 points] and an impromptu speech [10] with up to 5 points awarded for diction. He was awarded with a certificate of participation by the Acting President Mr Colin Cordon and Mr Peter Ellemor the Youth of the Year Chairperson. The school received a cheque for \$250 for supporting Henry in his endeavors.

Entries were judged on the quality of the photo, creativity of the concept, clear communication and exlanation of the photo. Annie's Entry entitled Magic Leak Proof Bag was the winning entry in the Years 8, 9 & 10 category. The prize was \$500 for the school to spend on science resources, equipment or promotion of girls in Science.

Magic Leak Proof Bag

This 'magic bag' is intended to contradict the audience's expectations. One would think that poking holes through a plastic bag full of water will result in water spilling everywhere, right? Wrong. The science behind this thought provoking experiment is illustrated through everyday household materials including a plastic bag, water and coloured pencils.

This experiment demonstrates how indestructible plastic bags are, and their negative impacts on the environment when littered. This practical uses simple concepts, including the strength of plastic and light refraction, revealing that the complexity of science is everywhere.





Science News

On Wednesday 28 February, our Year 10 Science class went to the Waite Institute to learn about genetics from one of the scientists working there. The Waite campus is one of the foremost facilities in agricultural genetic research. They have contributed notably to the production of crops like cotton and wheat in South Australia. We expanded on our knowledge of simple inheritance, and how a person's DNA relates to their physical appearance and biology. We also learned about the uses of genetic modification in growing drought and salinity resistant crops. The class used scientific equipment, like a gel electrophoresis tank, to conduct tests on DNA samples. This excursion will help us understand genetics on a deeper level as the unit continues.

Sports Report

2018 Unley High School Sport has hit the ground running, and now only 5 weeks in, a range and depth of sporting options have been on full display.

Our Open Boys Knockout cricket team have been exceptional, winning both their games to make the semi-final, which is still to be played. Leading from the front has been opening batsmen Jacob Earl, who has been outstanding. In the first match against Glenunga, he made 54 runs to place Unley to a defendable total of 116 after 35 overs. In the second match against Pedare, he carried his bat through the innings on a hot day to make 115 not out. His knock included 14 boundaries and 1 huge six that nearly entered the sports office! A notable mention must go to year 9 Oscar Grant, who held up one end for the last 12 overs after the score was at a dangerous 7/85. Oscar's effort of 6 runs off 29 balls was the perfect complement to Jacob, as they put on a 78 run partnership to carry the score to 163. In both matches, our unforgiving bowling line-up, led by the super economical Lachie Kleeman and Zac Heading, were too much for the opposition to handle.

We have had students compete in the Secondary School Triathlon and Swimming Championships. Students were impressive at the gruelling Triathlon, representing Unley High School well across our 4 teams. Special mention must go to Xavier Schwarzer, who competed in the individual championships, notably running the 8th fastest run time in his race, and to Phoebe Lane, Ned Harris and Asher Gillings, who finished 2nd in the U17 mixed competition. The Swimming Championships saw 21 Unley students race in a variety of strokes, doing the school proud with several top 3 finishes.

The first of three Girls Surf Days has been and gone, with 20 year 9 students enjoying the surf and developing their skills at Port Noarlunga.

We are represented in Badminton, Cricket, Indoor Soccer, Volleyball, Tennis and Basketball across 16 weekly teams this term, with all displaying outstanding efforts, talent and sportsmanship.

Coming up, we have more surf days, the Secondary School Tennis Championships, Open Knockout Softball, Beach Volleyball, the Cycling time trials, and of course Sports Day, Interschool Athletics and Head of the River.

Congratulations must go to year 9 student Harry Dillon, who during the holidays represented South Australia in Futsal (Indoor Soccer), making it all the way to the grand final. His fantastic performance as the SA goalkeeper was recognised with his selection to the Australian U15 team that will tour Brazil in November. Well done Harry.

\$20 million facilities upgrade at Unley High School

Planning is underway at Unley High School as the first stage of their Building Better Schools upgrade.

The plans propose to build a new two-storey contemporary learning hub for teaching arts, design, digital technologies, science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM) and to house a commercial kitchen for hospitality work. A new reception has also been proposed to be located on Kitchener Street.

In addition a new covered outdoor learning area is proposed, with an amphitheatre, landscaping, seating and shade structure.

Further plans include refurbishment of the existing gymnasium and removal of transportable buildings containing asbestos.

These initial plans are subject to further planning and may change.

I'm a teacher of English as a second language in Switzerland and I've been working as a trainee teacher at Unley High School since last July in the faculty of LOTE, and occasionally in the EALD faculty.

Over the last 3 terms, I've had the chance to observe different pedagogical approaches thanks to the many teachers who have welcomed me in their class. During this training, I've been able to live "school in the Australian way" and it's been a fantastic opportunity that has allowed me to widen my teaching habits and to live a very enriching professional experience.

Between the school I'm working in, in Switzerland and Unley High School, there are a number of differences, such as the uniform the students have to wear, the use of iPads in class for each student and the timetable. In fact, school in Switzerland starts at around eight and finishes at around 4.30, with a 2 hour break for lunch and on Wednesday there are lessons in the morning only. The school year starts at the end of August, which is the beginning of Autumn, and finishes at the end of June, leaving space for a two month summer holiday.

Materials and Service Charge 2018

Payment of fees and subject levies or a 'Commitment to Pay' needed to be completed by the end of Term One.

The charge of \$695, plus any applicable subject charges, were set by the Governing Council and approved by the Principal on behalf of the Chief Executive DECD. Incorporated within these fees are the essential components required to successfully complete the year at Unley High School. Included in the fee is access to equipment, textbooks, library, information technology, printing and use of consumables and resources for curriculum throughout the year.

Your attention to either payment of the fees, the completion of a 'Commitment to Pay' form or application for School Card would be appreciated. Forms are available from Students Services, and the School Card application can also be downloaded from www.decd.sa.gov.au.

Methods of payment include payment at the Finance Office between 8.00 am and 3.00 pm each day, payments on-line via the School's website or Direct Debit Deposits by Instalments via bank account or credit card. If fees are not paid in full then parents need to complete a 'Commitment To Pay' form and abide by the arrangements made on that form for payment of fees. If no arrangements are made then outstanding accounts will be forwarded to the Debt Collector by the end of Term 2.

School Card is available to:

families with children aged four years and over who attend a school full-time independent full time years 10 or 11 students who are studying six subjects independent full time year 12 students who are studying five subjects adult re-entry students undertaking DECD funded subjects at a government school

The state government is raising the school card income threshold in 2018 to help families with the increasing cost of living. This means that families with 1 child and a gross income for the 2016-2017 financial year of \$57,870 or less will be eligible.
