From the Principal

Dear Parents and Caregivers

Term 1 at Unley High School is always packed with diverse activities. This newsletter shares its flavour - and I hope you enjoy it. After a term of work in Years 8 to 12 subjects, written reports went home with students on the last day. Overall, Year 12 reports show students are working with purpose in class and during out of class time. Organisation, good study habits and time management are vital to keep pace.

Parent Teacher Interviews are scheduled for Thursday 10 May. Teachers look forward to meeting with parents and students on that day. A letter included with the Report outlines

the booking process. While interviews provide one way to reaffirm the essential partnership between home and school, we encourage parents from all year levels to contact us to share information and talk through any matters as they arise.

Community involvement, both local and global, continues to be important for UHS. After promoting and recognising Harmony Day, Student Voice ran a Pink Ribbon Foundation fundraiser. The pink tinged casual day initiative garnered over \$700. Well done also to our student tour guides who contributed their time to the huge response to the latest Principal's tour or spoke at the Special Interest Program Information session. These students are great role models. As a school we recently celebrated cultural learning and internationalism though involvement with the French Film Festival and Greek Independence Day. In late July, the annual Kyoto Study Tour students arrive. This is another inter-cultural highlight. Thank you to Unley High School families who have already offered to host a student. Opportunities to be a home-stay family still exist.

This newsletter acknowledges national and local sporting success, the progress of the 2018 Musical and the celebration of 40 years of Rowing at the school. The related article topically charts the moves toward gender equality in this sport. Our student rowers recently showcased their resilience and skill at the Head of the River Regatta. Congratulations go to all crews and coaches. Thank you to parents and supporters for the outstanding back up shown to all the rowers.

Next term, Year 9 students undertake NAPLAN tests. The resulting information provides teachers with useful data for each student about their reading, writing, spelling, grammar and numeracy. We use this along with PAT R/M data and subject grades to form a comprehensive picture of individual progress and to highlight areas for growth.

Staff will use the Pupil Free Day on Friday 8 June to undertake important training. Through Collaborative Moderation, teachers work with colleagues from nearby schools to share tasks, and check for consistency of assessment against the Australian Curriculum standards. On the following Tuesday, (Monday is a Public Holiday) teaching staff will continue professional learning in a number of areas. This provides a long weekend break in the winter term for students and their families.

With the installation of the new facade on Kitchener Street, STEM Works progresses well. On other technology related news, please note the iPad parent workshops advertised in these pages, and the positive outcomes of the Term 1 mobile phone trial will see this process extended into the regular workings of the school.

We look forward to welcoming students on Monday 30 April to begin Term 2, and wish all a safe holiday.

Students do not attend school on Parent Teacher Interview days but are strongly encouraged to attend the interviews with their parent/caregivers.






Harmony Day 2018

Summer Rowing Camp



Head of the River and Presentation Dinner

On Saturday March 25, more than one hundred Unley High School rowers competed at the Schools' Head of the River. The school community came out in force to support the athletes. A rowing parent, Oscar Asbanu, added to the atmosphere by entertaining with didgeridoo and drum beats as each boat entered the water. Unley High School boated twenty-one crews on the day, the second largest number of entries from a single school. Of those crews, eleven finished in the top four while the Year 8 Boys F crew (Diego Tovar Gallo, Cameron Gray, Dylan Riddell, Finn Graziano, Lachie Ling – cox) secured a win in their division of racing. Other significant results included second placings for the Schoolgirl 1st IV who were looking to make it three in a row and the Schoolboy Year 10 B Quad Scull who came up just short to a strong finishing St Peter's College crew. In addition, the Schoolboy 1st VIII rowed superbly in tough cross head wind conditions to finish third behind St Peter's College and Pembroke School. This crew finished ahead of traditional powerhouses Prince Alfred College and Scotch College to record the best Unley result in a 1st VIII race in more than a decade. Well done to all crews who competed with great pride on this special day.

On the Saturday evening, the UHS rowing community celebrated the rowing season at the annual Presentation Dinner held in the George Cresswell Hall. The squad captains spoke passionately about their squad highlights and notable moments of the year, with all making special mention of the tireless work and support of their coaches and families. Sprint Kayaking National Championships, Penrith, NSW

Between 4-10 March 2018 I was lucky enough to compete at the National Sprint Kayak Championships, held in Penrith, near Sydney. I started kayaking just over two years ago, and am a member of Holdfast Bay Canoe Club where I try and train up to 5 times a week. Every day had an early start of 5am, followed by warm-ups, racing and cool-downs. The week consisted of heats, semi-finals and finals over a range of distances including 200m, 500m, 1000m and 2500m. I raced in a K1 (solo), and K2 and K4, with one and three other paddlers respectively. I made every final in all of my K1 events, but missed out on a medal other than in the 2500m. Overall I came away with a Silver and 2 Bronze medals.

At the end of the week I was told that I had made the State Development Team and the National Talent Squad. I was also lucky enough to be selected to represent Australia in the U16 team in the Asia-Pacific Regatta, to be held at West Lakes in May. After the summer sprint



season finishes, the winter season consists of longer distances, and I am planning to compete in the Murray Marathon for the second time, where I will paddle 50km in three days over the June long weekend.

Australian Rowing Championships

Year 12 student, Mitchell Reinhard competed at the recent Australian Rowing Championships held at the Sydney International Regatta Centre. Mitch undertook a busy program over the course of the week and achieved considerable success:

5th Place as part of the State Crew in the Men's Youth VIII
6th Place in the U19 Single Scull
SILVER in the Open Lightweight Men's VIII with NSW and SA rowers
GOLD in the U19 Double Scull with Angus Dawson from St Peters
GOLD in the Schoolboy Single Scull – this was the only medal won by a South Australian in a school's race at the Championships

Last season, Mitch participated as part of the Australian U21 Rowing team and he will once again attend trials to try and earn a place in another Australian team. Good luck, Mitch!







Unley High School Rowing Club 40th Anniversary Dinner

The 2017-2018 rowing season marked the 40th Anniversary of the formation of the Unley High School Rowing Club (UHSRC). To acknowledge this milestone, UHSRC organised a celebratory function in the school's Rose Garden on Saturday February 17th and an 'old-scholar' row at the Torrens on the following morning. The 150 attendees on the evening were treated to finger food and live music, a memorabilia display and some interesting speeches highlighting some of the key moments in the club's history.

Current President, Chris Ford officially opened the evening and outlined how far the club has come; from a couple of boats in a tin shed to some of the club's recent accomplishments.

Anna Tree, (UHS – 1988-1992), whose significant credentials include being part of the winning UHS crew in the inaugural Schoolgirls 1st



VIII rowing at Nationals in 1992, medalling at Junior World Championship level and having success as an international rowing coach at the AIS, spoke highly of how the important qualities of camaraderie, inclusivity, commitment, diversity, encouragement, tradition, and leadership were developed through her involvement with rowing at UHS. She acknowledged how these qualities still are integral to her everyday home and work life.

The club founder, Liesl Vanderwerp's address outlined the numerous opportunity and resource discrepancies between male and female sports at the time when she introduced rowing to girls at UHS. At the school level, the budget for girl's sport was significantly less than that for the boys, and there was not even an office space allocated to the Girl's Sport Coordinator. The girls initially raced in Ladies events as there was nothing for schoolgirls. The Head of the River (HOR) was also only for schoolboy crews. It took letters in 1988 from UHS girls to the Equal Opportunities Commissioner at the time, to ensure that for every boy's race held at HOR, there had to be a female equivalent race. This initially saw the introduction of underage schoolgirl races at the HOR, with a schoolgirl 1st VIII race occurring for the first time the following year. Thanks to the interest and dedication of people such as Liesl and our rowing girls of the 1980s, UHS were real trailblazers for schoolgirl rowing here in South Australia.

A group of UHS rowers from the early 1980s spoke about one of their fellow crew members, Chuan Lai, who tragically died in a ferry capsize in Malaysia in 1985. They wanted to make sure current rowers were aware of the significance of The Chuan Lai Shield for the Most Valuable Clubperson. According to Liz Jones, Chuan was an amazing young man and the awarding of the shield each year is to help the next generation of rowers learn the values he so passionately stood for: honour, inclusivity, family, commitment, courage, humour and above all, putting the welfare of others before oneself. Matthew Draper successfully coached UHS crews over a 10-year period in the club's formative years. Since then he has undertaken various administrative roles including High Performance Manager and Director of Development and Events with Rowing Australia, Continental Events Coordinator at FISA, Rowing Technical Advisor for the International University Sports Federation and is currently responsible for the general administration of the High Performance and National Team program and the logistical coordination of the Sport Science and Sport Medicine team for Rowing Canada. While Matthew was unable to attend he sent a letter that was read on the night. He acknowledged that 'being part of something good, is great for the soul' and in his years coaching at UHS, he saw the impact and appreciated the power of sport to change lives. He has promised to attend the 50th anniversary celebration.



The Sunday morning culminated in a 'row' at the Torrens, where past and present rowers came together to share more stories whilst completing several laps of the Torrens at a more leisurely pace than usually undertaken during a training session. Several 'old' rowers had the privilege of also rowing in one of the club's old wooden boats, the Liesl Vanderwerp, which was christened by the club back in the 1980s.

Thank you to all rowers, their families, coaches and school staff who have been involved in and supported the club over the past 40 years.

Courtney Size, Rilla Hernandez and Jodie Brady deserve special acknowledgement for all their hard work in organising this significant event for the UHSRC.

STEM Works update



Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

All schools are required to collect information about the numbers of students that they provide adjustments to under the Disability Discrimination Act (1992) and Disability Standards of Education (2005). From 2018, this data will be used as the basis for national funding.



The NCCD involves the collection of:

- the number of students receiving adjustments to enable them to participate in education on the same basis as other students
- the level of adjustment provided to students
- student's type of disability if known

Under the model the definition of disability is broad and includes learning difficulties, health and mental health conditions. If your child is identified for inclusion in the Collection, the required information will be included in this year's data collection.

NAPLAN 2018

NAPLAN Testing for all Year 9 students will occur in Week 3, Term 2.

These tests are aligned to the Australian Curriculum: English and Mathematics. NAPLAN individual student reports are expected to be ready for distribution to parents/caregivers during August and September.

Materials and Service Charge 2018

Payment of fees and subject levies or a 'Commitment to Pay' needed to be completed by the end of Term One.

The charge of \$695, plus any applicable subject charges, were set by the Governing Council and approved by the Principal on behalf of the Chief Executive DECD. Incorporated within these fees are the essential components required to successfully complete the year at Unley High School. Included in the fee is access to equipment, textbooks, library, information technology, printing and use of consumables and resources for curriculum throughout the year.

Your attention to either payment of the fees, completion of a 'Commitment to Pay' form from the Finance Office or application for School Card would be appreciated. Forms are available from Students Services, and the School Card application can also be downloaded from www.decd.sa.gov.au.

Methods of payment include payment at the Finance Office between 8.00 am and 3.00 pm each day, payments on-line via website or Direct Debit Deposits by Instalments via bank account or credit card. If fees are not paid in full then parents need to complete a 'Commitment To Pay' form and abide by the arrangements made on that form for payment of fees. If no arrangements are made then outstanding accounts will be forwarded to the Debt Collector by the end of Term 2.


