

From the Principal

Dear Parents and Caregivers

Community involvement is important for this school, and for us all. This newsletter outlines recent activities highlighting our community connections. Reconciliation Week was acknowledged at an assembly run by students who welcomed indigenous performer Isaac Hannam. Isaac is an expert on the yidaki. He recently performed at the opening of the Commonwealth Games. Middle School students ran a successful Cancer Council Biggest Morning Tea as a great fundraising initiative. We have had a good response from families looking to home stay host a student from the upcoming Kyoto Study Tour. During Volunteers Week a special afternoon tea was held to thank volunteers from Parent Voice, Facilities and ICT committees, Canteen, Library, Governing Council, Rowing and

Greek Parent groups. Students in all year levels took part in a range of activities including the Design trip to Sydney, an Art trip to Melbourne and 'Generations of Jazz' festival in Mt Gambier. Guest speakers addressed students on leadership, safe partying and resilience. Year 8 Drama performances, the Autumn Music concert, a Techno bullying workshop, visits by authors and environmentalists, bushwalking camps and winter sports have occurred or are well underway. Students contributed to the UN Youth Voice Competition, Debating and various sporting competitions. They participated in the French Film Festival, the Impressionist exhibition and their academic achievements have been celebrated at assemblies. In old scholar news, congratulations go to 2017 Head Prefect Nic Dannell who has been awarded the Adelaide University Principal's Scholarship. I was recently invited to take part in the French engagement strategy with local universities and had the privilege of meeting French Ambassador Monsieur Pernout at the University of Adelaide.

It is pleasing to see the STEM project work nearing Stage 1 completion. The plan is to complete Stage 1 by the holidays and begin the refurbishment of two further laboratories in Term 3. Additional works are being costed and completion of Stage 2 looks to be the end of December. The STEM Leaders team is currently developing a Year 8 approach to STEM learning for 2019 while the new Year 10 STEM elective starts in Semester 2 this year.

Staff will use the student-free day on Friday 8 June to undertake important training in Collaborative Moderation with colleagues from our secondary school partnership. This takes the form of comparing work samples and tasks for consistency of teaching, learning and assessment against the Australian Curriculum standards. Professional Learning on Tuesday 12 June includes whole of school work with a Dyslexia specialist and input on Work, Health and Safety.

It is interesting to note conversations in the community about the future move of Year 7s into public secondary schools. I recently received a letter from the Hon John Gardner Minister for Education guaranteeing the Building Better Schools \$20M grant, "mindful of future enrolment expectations". As a community we look forward to the commencement of this much anticipated building work.

UN Voice

On Monday 23 April, I took a plane to Brisbane along with six other teens to represent South Australia in the National Final round of the United Nations Youth Voice Competition. This public speaking competition is unique in that it asks contestants to present innovative and practical solutions to some of the world's most pressing issues. Each state selects a team of the best young speakers from between Year 7 and Year 10 and this year there was a total of 58 participants.

On the first day, we presented our first speeches and attended an address by the Lord Mayor of Brisbane. Then we met a politician who said that our generation was entitled and unmotivated: ironic, considering that the secret topic for the Grand Final round was how can we stop the perpetuation of negative stereotypes about young people?





The next day we presented our second speeches at Queensland University — locally known as the Sandstone University for its stunning stone architecture. The finalists for the Grand Final Round and the secret topic were announced, and those lucky ten were given just two hours to prepare their speeches. On the last day we made our way to the Supreme Court of Brisbane to hear the finalists deliver their speeches. They all produced speeches of the highest quality, despite the limited time for preparation. Unfortunately, no South Australians made it into the finals, but I thoroughly enjoyed being a part of the competition. I know this is clichéd, but I made amazing friends at UN Voice and learned a lot from masters of public speaking. Art News

Featuring more than 65 masterpieces from the renowned collection of the Musée d'Orsay in Paris, Colours of Impressionism is currently underway at the Adelaide Art Gallery. The exhibition, starring works by Monet, Renoir, Manet and Pissarro, aligned perfectly with the Impressionist unit of the Year 10 art curriculum.

So, on the 23rd of May, three classes had the opportunity to attend the exhibition. It was a unique experience to see the paintings that rejected age-old realist traditions for soulful, dynamic impressions of moments artists observed in their surroundings, in a move that radically reshaped art in the nineteenth century. We marvelled at

In addition to this, we also visited the contemporary exhibit. We were overwhelmed by a massive installation piece of a Dungeons & Dragons board and mystified by a life-size sculpture of three floating female figures, some missing hands and feet. Realist painter Lisa Adam's cryptic, photo-realistic oil paintings and metal sculptor Nike Savva's floor-to-ceiling curtain made of tiny mirrors dominated the upstairs wing. Overall, the excursion was a thoroughly engaging and thought provoking event that captivated the interest of art lovers and novices alike.






Autumn Concert

My child is "addicted to screens": Working with families with concerns about technology use in their child

One of the most common stressors for parents/caregivers in 2018 is managing their children's device or technology usage. This is true for all families, but particularly true for children with behavioural, social and emotional challenges. It can be particularly difficult for these families because:

- These children are sometimes managing their distress/overload/stressors by using screens/devices/gaming to cope with life - and find it harder than other children to just "switch off"
- Parents/caregivers of children with challenges are usually dealing with more stress than the average parent - and therefore find it especially hard to find the huge emotional resources required in managing tech use in their children.
- Children with emotional/social/behavioural challenges are more likely to experience stronger than average frustration and disappointment - meaning turning screens off is even tougher for them
- It's not surprising then that putting limits on these activities is extremely difficult
 for parents/caregivers AND children. Most parents understand they DO need to do
 this but it's one of the hardest issues they face.



PARKING RESTRICTIONS AT SCHOOLS ARE FOR THE SAFETY OF YOUR CHILDREN

Local Councils impose a variety of parking restrictions at and near schools to achieve a safer environment for your children. These restrictions are also to optimise traffic movement and safety.

NO STOPPING ZONES -

These zones are usually adjacent to school entrances and the approach and departure sides of school crossings.

You must not stop your vehicle in a no Stopping zone or on a Solid yellow line, not even for a few seconds.



NO PARKING ZONES -

You may stop in a No Parking zone to immediately pick up or set down your child, and drive off as soon as possible.



You must not leave your vehicle parked or unattended. If you are going to collect your child from this zone, have your child wait nearby in the school grounds so they can see you arrive. On your arrival they can then leave the school ground, enter your vehicle and you can then drive off.

CONTINUOUS WHITE CENTRE LINE -

If a road has a continuous white centre line, there must be 3 metres between the vehicle and the white line.

SCHOOL CROSSINGS -

Australian road rules A4.indd 1

You cannot stop within 20m of the approach side or 10m of the departure side of a school crossing.

SPEED LIMITS -

Speeding vehicles in a school zone are highly dangerous for children. There is a speed limit of 25 kph, designated by the signs and a zigzag line below, any time when children are present or when the lights are flashing (depending on the type of crossing).








INTERSECTION OR T-INTERSECTION

(Restricted Area)

You cannot park within 10m of the intersection.



CROSSING PLACES (driveways)

You may park so that the front of your vehicle is level with the approach or the back is level with the departure side of a driveway to any private or public property so that vehicles can enter and depart safely.

FOOTPATHS / NATURE STRIPS -

Parking is prohibited at all times. It creates dangerous situations for both pedestrians and other vehicles in the vicinity.

Creates dangerous situations anytime, however the danger is increased near schools, especially when children are entering or leaving school.
