



### From the Principal



The last half of Term 3 saw many highlights at Unley High School. We were pleased to be further recognised in the Apple Distinguished Program Award for our teaching work in Digital Learning Technologies – this time the award spans 2018 to 2020. Assistant Principal Jenny Johns has led the latest work in this area. The Annual Greek Spring Dance was another successful event. For over 30 years the Greek Parent Committee and students have organised this great cultural and family event. Congratulations to all involved under the leadership of President, Ourania Ntafillis.

Arts and Multicultural Week saw a whole school assembly with a range of inputs by students who reflected on the diversity of our school's cultural mix. Held in the much used George Cresswell Hall, it was a real tribute to the creativeness and dedication of the student group led by Director Year 12 student Kathryn McCloy, and supported by Arts Coordinator Chris Martin and a team of volunteer teachers. There are many other Arts items covered in this addition and more to come in the remainder of the year.

In STEM news, this newsletter summarises a variety of the enrichment opportunities for students in the Sciences and Design and Technology. The official opening of the new STEM Area is planned for early February. Several groups are using it already and while Stage 1 is totally complete, the STEM Works grant has been stretched through clever planning to encompass an internal re-fit of two additional laboratories. This work will be completed in December which means the 'grand opening' needs to wait on the return to school next year.

As part of the French Bilingual/ Binational program and Unley High School's membership of the Association of Australian French English Schools, we have been invited to host the AAFEBS National Conference in Week 1 of Term 4. This will be opened by the Minister for Education John Gardner and will also welcome Rick Persse CE of DfE as the new Honorary President. In other Languages news, in November the school will be notified of the outcome of an Expression of Interest to be considered for a grant to develop the International Baccalaureate Diploma Program as an additional option to SACE in Senior School. I hope you enjoy the achievements of our young people and the other school news contained in this September issue.

## STEM Challenge

Overall, the day was great fun and definitely worth it as we were able to utilise our STEM skills and challenge our thinking, whilst gaining knowledge from some qualified Defence officers who are currently working in the STEM industry and who provided mentoring on the day.

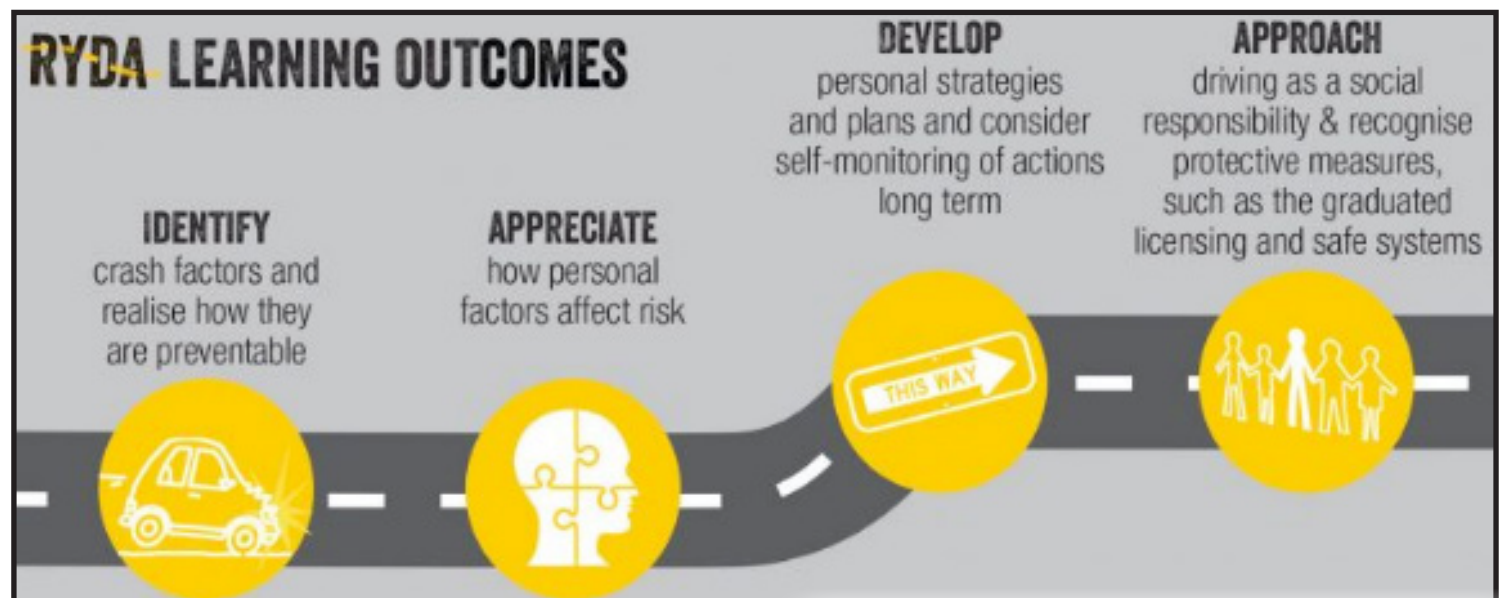
## RYDA Road Safety Program

On Wednesday 19 September, Year 10 students participated in the RYDA (Rotarian Youth Driver Awareness) program. RYDA is a series of practical and powerful workshops for high school students that challenges students to change the way they think about road safety and lays the foundation for safe road use throughout their lives.

The sessions that students participated in allowed them to reflect on their own choices as both a driver and a passenger. They heard real life stories from crash survivors, and learnt about the impact that a crash has on the driver, their friends, family and other people on the road. Cornes Toyota donated a brand-new Camry for the day so that students could experience up close how long it takes a car to stop at various speeds, and the possible consequences of travelling above the speed limit.

Some of the words that students used to describe the day were “informative, interesting and pretty cool”. The students said that most sessions were of high quality and they learnt a lot, especially about the factors that can contribute to road crashes

## Generations of Change

On the 11th September, twelve students participated in the workshop, 'Generations of Change', run by Reconciliation SA. Its purpose was to educate students about racism so they knew how to identify and prevent it. We watched a play performed by a theatre company. It contained a main character who often said racial slurs and didn't care for other's feelings. Afterwards, we were asked to reenact a certain scene and to try and stop the bully from being racist; this gave each student a chance to show how they would react to the situation and decide whether it was an effective response. Our final activity was to brainstorm how we could continue to prevent racism at our school. Our three main ideas were to: incorporate different cultural perspectives more in curriculum, so students learn to appreciate and understand various cultures; have more of a focus on racism in Pastoral Care, as this gives students a chance to identify racism and find an effective way to respond; and, our last idea was to create many visual representations that directly address racism. We could put them in classes and regularly change the posters, so that it is constantly educating students about these topics. Overall, there were many fun activities that we took part in and everyone commented on how informative and eye opening it was.
