From the Principal

As you know, Brenda Harris has been on leave for the first part of this year. She has recently made a decision not to return to her role as Principal of Unley High School. We thank Brenda for her leadership over the previous four years. Brenda was instrumental in guiding the completion of our new STEM centre, working effectively with Governing Council to secure the \$32.5M for facilities upgrades, implementing the French Bilingual/Bi-National program and initiating the school's candidacy for the International Baccalaureate Diploma program. Brenda's intention is to continue to work in Education as she transitions to retirement and we wish her well in her endeavours. The school will have an opportunity to thank and farewell Brenda at the Year 12 Graduation held in Term 4. The role of Principal will be advertised and a replacement announced before the end of the year. In the meantime, I will continue as caretaker Principal.

I am excited to report that the architects for the \$32.5M upgrade have been announced and we welcome Thomson Rossi to the project. This appointment has allowed all parties; architects, engineers and costing teams, to meet and start the initial consultation process. I hope to have some concept drawings to share in the next newsletter. We have also initiated an architect process for costing three smaller capital works projects that are outside the major upgrade. These projects can then be carried out whenever we have enough funds. Before our last Governing Council Meeting we held a community consultation with students, teachers and parents to show our ideas and seek their feedback. The areas we are targeting are the library, the canteen and more toilets in the main building.

Inside this newsletter you will see we have honoured Elfie Temby for her ongoing work supporting our Unley High School staff. Although she has technically retired, Elfie still comes in a couple of days a week and continues to be a welcomed member of staff.

Term 3 has been a busy time for international visitors with students from Kyoto in Japan and visiting teachers from South Korea. All enjoyed their time in South Australia and at Unley High School. I would like to say a big thank you to all the parents who provided home-stay and to the students who acted as buddies for our Kyoto visitors. Well done to all!

Well done to our brand new Pedal Prix team. Only their second competition race and they have improved again. Good luck in the 24 hour race at Murray Bridge in September.

I hope everyone caught The Advertiser's football greats expose of Adelaide schools. On August 9, two classes of Year 8 History students braved a long bus ride and inhospitable conditions to experience a taste of medieval life in Tanunda, which on the 10th and 11th of August hosted its inaugural Medieval Fair. For the first time (to my knowledge) a schools' day was offered, where medievalists could instruct young historians on areas of their expertise. The fair offered demonstrations from a blacksmith, a cooper, some Roman revivalists (and since the end of the Roman Empire DID mark the beginning of Medieval times, their presence can be justified), an apothecary/herbalist, and some medieval martial arts and lifestyles groups to name a few. Students boarded the bus, which left at 8:30am sharp, arriving at Tanunda just after 10:00. Due to the inclement weather, extra shelters had



been erected, but only scattered showers ensued, although the wind chill factor had a 'feels like' temperature of 0.9. However, as a friend recently told me, 'There is no bad weather, there is simply bad preparation.' It is fair to say that some of our students learned about preparation that day. Two of the activities were physical, involving shooting some arrows and learning fencing with great-swords. Unley High School students also represented well in the great-sword one-arm-lift competition and students were able to handle items and equipment that have been faithfully reproduced from medieval times. Despite the challenging elements, it was a most worthwhile excursion, and the students were really positive about their experiences. She worked at McLeod Tyres where her translating skills came in handy, because at that time the company was vulcanising tyres for retreads and the instructions had to be translated from German.

She has lots of things to do at home but is looking forward to returning to the staffroom a couple of days a week to 'keep an eye on things'.

We were very pleased to welcome four Korean teachers from Cheongju, Korea in Weeks 2 and 3 of Term 3. Mr Myeonghan Choi, Ms Young-Mi Pyun, Mr Eui Seong Hwang and Ms Hyaebin Lee observed our teachers and students and greatly enjoyed interacting with students and staff. It was a pleasure to get to know them, and to speak to them about the differences between the Korean and Australian education systems. One class of Year 10 students had the opportunity to participate in a Korean cultural lesson on traditional dance styles, presented by our visitors, which was a great opportunity for developing inter cultural understanding. Victoria Park Race 2, 28 July 2019

The Unley High School Pedal Prix team participated in their second race on 28 July at Victoria Park. All nine members of the team contributed to the race. Since the first event in June, the team have been preparing on weekends for this event regardless of the weather.

The day started at 7.30am for the students, parents, Mr Joshua Whitwell and Mr Jake Campbell from Unley High School. We assembled tents, tarps, carpets, tables and chairs. Riders had the first taste of the day as spectators observing the open category winning teams completing the exhibition laps.



At 9.15am with all 172 bikes, we had to grid up on the start line, this time we were 18th on the grid due to our performance in last race. We were in the S2 category for year 8 - year 10 students male and female among 65 teams.

Our team rode for 6 hours around the 1.35km track and covered 218km. A massive effort from our 9 riders who displayed wonderful fitness and experience throughout the day. Despite a couple of crashes and near misses, we finished 7th in our category of 65 teams and 15th overall out of 172 teams. What a wonderful effort by all the students.

Our bike looked great with the school logos thanks to the Art department. A special thanks goes to Jake and Josh for providing support and guidance to parents and riders alike.

Our next race will be the 24-hour race in Murray Bridge on 21st and 22nd September. We will be training every week to prepare for the next race.

The following article appeared in The Advertiser - Greatest school footy teams published on the Adelaide Now website on August 13

Unley High's greatest team reads like a Sturt who's who.Unley High old scholars and Sturt players There is 1961 Magarey medallist John Halbert in the centre, 1930s superboot Bo Morton, who the club's best and fairest medal is named after, at full-forward, cult hero Peter Endersbee in one forward pocket, All-Australian big man Clayton Thompson in the other and the SANFL's 10th-most prolific goalkicker Malcolm Greenslade on an attacking flank. Wingman Clarrie Scrutton and four-time premiership-winning centre half-back Rick Schoff, like Halbert and Morton, are in Sturt's Team of the Century. Reliable defender Terry Short has five Double Blues flags, while on the opposite wing to 1920s star Clarrie Scrutton is Ross Treleaven, a triple best and fairest recipient of the '30s.In fact, only six members of this team did not play league football for Sturt. Unley High old scholar Terry Short during a Sturt training in 1961. They are: 1950s tennis ace and state footballer Ken McGregor (centre half-forward), former Crows captain and five-time All-Australian Simon Goodwin (half-back), South Adelaide Team of the Century member Bob Schmidt (half-back), Glenelg's 1934 Magarey medallist George "Blue" Johnston (ruck), another brilliant tap man, former West captain Colin Smith (bench), and the third-placed finisher in the 1954 Brownlow Medal, Essendon club champion John Gill, who is also a ruckman (interchange).

Finalising the squad was incredibly difficult. Sturt's Reg Whitehead's two premierships, captaincy in 1926 and best-on-ground performance in ruck in the 1919 flag win earns him a spot on the bench. But his younger brother, Charlie, was overlooked despite being a consistent ruckman during a similar era and claiming one premiership.Others to narrowly miss selection were gritty 1930s Double Blues half-back flanker Edgar Sims, Sturt goalkicker Paul Caust, ex-South, Sydney and Norwood ruckman Stephen Doyle, former Crows and Saints backman James Begley and 1991 North premiership player Tim Nunan.James Begley, pictured right chasing a young Gary Ablett Jr during a trial game, narrowly missed selection. Roosters and Redlegs tall Greg Schlein, West Torrens state player Ossie "Pat" O'Grady, dual Panthers flag winner Errol Sterzl, West and Glenelg's Brooke Fogden and Double Blues Don Harris, Gordon Day, Don Bartlett, Laurie Simon, Bill Kutcher and Bruce Raymond were also considered, along with current players Andre Parrella and Henry Carey.Even though the team already has two players with fewer than 60 matches to their names with Endersbee (46) and McGregor (54), 58-game spearhead Malcolm "Emmy" Jones's also makes the cut in a tight call. Jones's finals feats, including six goals during the 1965 grand final loss to Port Adelaide and a club record 19 during the next year's major round with eight in the Double Blues' flag win over Port, as well as legendary coach Jack Oatey picking him at full-forward of his greatest Sturt 21 got him the nod over Charlie Whitehead. Halbert, who captained Sturt from 1962-68, including to the 1966 flag, was named skipper of this side.

Parent Update Week 5, Term 3 - 2019

Year 7 will be taught in high school from term 1, 2022.

This means from 2022, year 6 will be the last year of primary school and year 7 will be the first year of high school.

This is a big change for our public education system. We'll be providing regular updates about the move and what it means for your child.

Why we're moving year 7

Year 7 is already part of high school across the country, so we're bringing South Australia in line with the rest of Australia, and with other education systems in our state.

The planning process

We'll be ready for the move in 2022. We've done our homework to make sure there's enough space at high schools. We're investing \$185m in our schools to manage increasing enrolments, which includes providing general and specialist learning areas.

Benefits for your child

Your child's learning is our priority and we want to make sure they get the best learning opportunities from their new high school environment.

The Australian Curriculum for year 7 was designed to be taught in high school, and your child will benefit from specialist teachers in specialist high school facilities.

We can see in many of our R - 12 schools, and from the interest in our pilot schools, that year 7s are ready and keen for high school.



PARKING RESTRICTIONS AT SCHOOLS ARE FOR THE SAFETY OF YOUR CHILDREN

8

Local Councils impose a variety of parking restrictions at and near schools to achieve a safer environment for your children. These restrictions are also to optimise traffic movement and safety.

NO STOPPING ZONES -

These zones are usually adjacent to school entrances and the approach and departure sides of school crossings.

You must not stop your vehicle in a no stopping zone or on a solid yellow line, not even for a few seconds.

NO PARKING ZONES -

You may stop in a No Parking zone to immediately pick up or set down your child, and drive off as soon as possible.

No Parking zones are to ensure a quick and smooth turnover of vehicles.

You must not leave your vehicle parked or unattended. If you are going to collect your child from this zone, have your child wait nearby in the school grounds so they can see you arrive. On your arrival they can then leave the school ground, enter your vehicle and you can then drive off.

CONTINUOUS WHITE CENTRE LINE -

If a road has a continuous white centre line, there must be 3 metres between the vehicle and the white line.

SCHOOL CROSSINGS -

You cannot stop within 20m of the approach side or 10m of the departure side of a school crossing.



Speeding vehicles in a school zone are highly dangerous for children. There is a speed limit of 25 kph, designated by the signs and a zigzag line below, any time when children are present or when the lights are flashing (depending on the type of crossing).



INTERSECTION OR T-INTERSECTION

(Restricted Area)

You cannot park within 10m of the intersection.





CROSSING PLACES (driveways)

You may park so that the front of your vehicle is level with the approach or the back is level with the departure side of a driveway to any private or public property so that vehicles can enter and depart safely.

FOOTPATHS / NATURE STRIPS -

Parking is prohibited at all times. It creates dangerous situations for both pedestrians and other vehicles in the vicinity.

DOUBLE PARKING -

Creates dangerous situations anytime, however the danger is increased near schools, especially when children are entering or leaving school.
