Welcome to the Unley High School Newsletter.

Last week I sent out information about a concerning person on Tik Tok and YouTube whose views have spread quickly around our student community. I would like to thank all parents who took the time to have a family conversation and also thank those parents who have sent emails of support. In this newsletter we celebrate the achievements of Kelly Vincent. Please enjoy reading about her outstanding career on the political stage.

It is also fantastic that the Royal Adelaide Show will go ahead this year and students can enjoy their Show Day Holiday on Monday.

Students performing in this concert are nominated by their examiner as a student who has demonstrated an ability (under exam conditions) to display an engaging, polished and commanding performance of one of their exam pieces.

This recognition is especially significant for Unley HS as **Melson Shi** (11) was the winner of this exact same prize and performance honour at the 2021 Australian Music Examination Board's SA and NT end-of-year Prize Winner's Concert. Congratulations Yoyo and Melson, we are proud of your outstanding musical achievements.

The JazzSA Superbands are a program of three youth big bands open to South Australian musicians aged 21 years and younger. Each term the Superbands rehearse intensively and perform a full set of professional-level repertoire under the supervision of Adelaide's leading big band directors.

The Superbands provide young musicians who have a keen interest in big band music with the opportunity to expand their knowledge of the style and repertoire beyond that of most high school ensembles, through performing a mixture of classic and contemporary big band arrangements, alongside works by local and national composers. Many participants gain a foothold in the local music scene while in the Superbands, through having the chance to interact with like-minded musicians their age, and by bringing their abilities and progress to the attention of the directors.

Some of the young performers will go on to become international soloists or members of Australia's symphony orchestras or music teachers, but all will gain lifelong benefits from their experience with South Australia's leading youth music organisation.

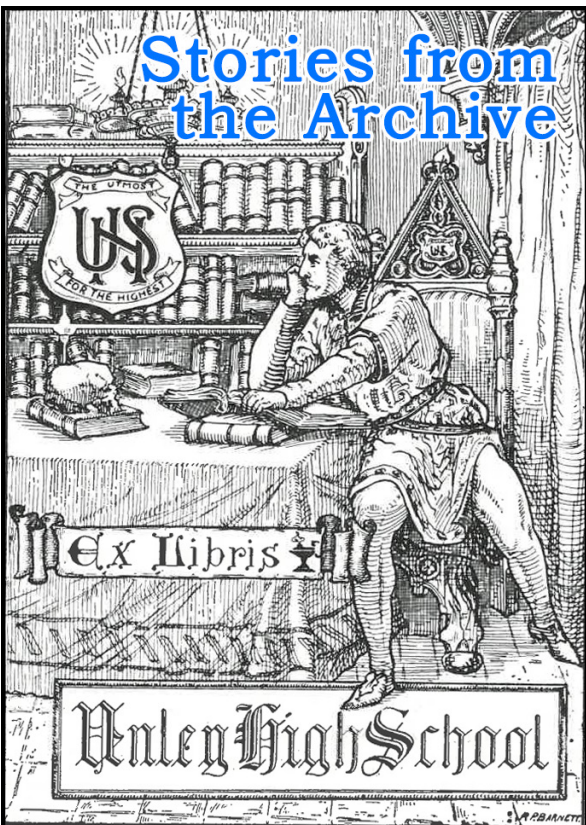

Kelly Vincent – from Unley High School to Upper House

In this fifth and final instalment of profiles of those esteemed Old Scholars after whom our school Houses are now named, we come to our most recent former student, Kelly Vincent.

Kelly attended Unley High School from 2002 to 2006. In fact, a few staff members who were here then, are still here.

In 2005, Kelly's Year 11 home group was 11.216. She was in the LINK program. Kelly was born with cerebral palsy.

One of two articles she contributed to the 2005 Yearbook began: "Have you ever seen an UHS student racing about in a wheelchair and thought 'WOW!!' Look at that grace, style and skill!' Or are you just like the rest of them who think, 'Get out of the way.' Well, the LINK room is where these maniacs come from...."

Not only was Kelly stylish in her wheelchair, she was excellent at French. She won the Academic Excellence Award for French in Year 12 in 2006.

She became fluent in Spanish too, and developed serious literary pursuits. Actor and playwright are two other descriptions of Kelly.

Just four years after leaving Unley, Kelly, who also identifies as bisexual, created Australian parliamentary history.

As a member of the Dignity Party she became, at 21, the youngest ever member of the South Australian Parliament and the youngest woman to be elected to any Australian parliament.

Kelly served an eight-year term in the upper house, the Legislative Council, sitting on several parliamentary committees examining a range of issues including those relevant to people with disabilities.

In 2017 she was awarded a Zonta Women of Achievement Award for Outstanding Achievement in Human Rights.

After defeat in the 2018 state election, attributed by her to the introduction of optional preferential voting, Kelly helped establish the True Ability Theatre Company.

Last year, her first book was published. 'Dandelion Heart' is a collection of essays and poems.

The inspiring story of Unley old scholar Kelly Vincent is still in its early chapters.

We thank her for on-going association with the school and wish her continued accomplishment.

Donations to the Archive



A recent donation has created a literary link to one of Unley High School's most significant teachers in its early years. The gift is of 17 books that were personally owned by May Mills, an Unley teacher and senior mistress between 1920 and 1953.

Miss Mills was much more than a respected teacher. According to the 2010 school history by Craig Campbell, Miss Mills was an early champion of school sport for girls and became a significant force in the development of women's sport across the state.

She also served as president of the SA Teachers Union, among many other roles and accomplishments. She was appointed an OBE (Order of the British Empire) in 1960.

The collection covers a diverse range of subject areas, including her teaching specialisation of geography. We are deeply grateful to the Mitcham Heritage Research Centre for the donation.

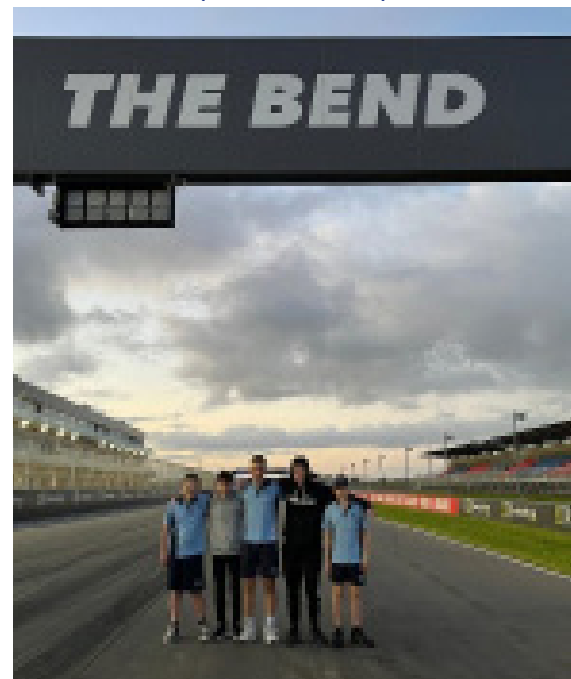

STEM Day out @ Science Alive

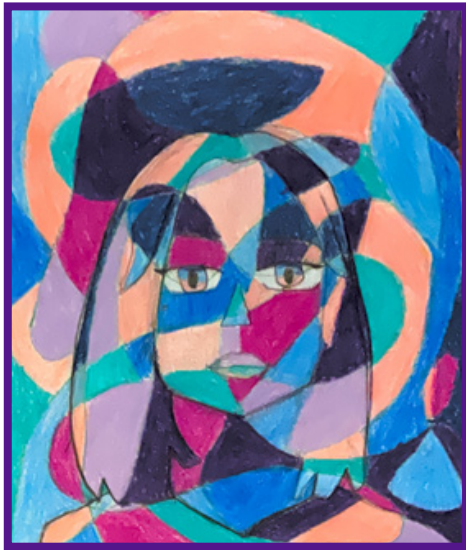

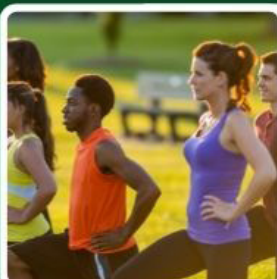

PARKING RESTRICTIONS AT SCHOOLS ARE FOR THE SAFETY OF YOUR CHILDREN

Local Councils impose a variety of parking restrictions at and near schools to achieve a safer environment for your children. These restrictions are also to optimise traffic movement and safety.

NO STOPPING ZONES -

These zones are usually adjacent to school entrances and the approach and departure sides of school crossings.

You must not stop your vehicle in a no stopping zone or on a solid yellow line, not even for a few seconds.



NO PARKING ZONES -

You may stop in a No Parking zone to immediately pick up or set down your child, and drive off as soon as possible.

No Parking zones are to ensure a quick and smooth turnover of vehicles.



You must not leave your vehicle parked or unattended. If you are going to collect your child from this zone, have your child wait nearby in the school grounds so they can see you arrive. On your arrival they can then leave the school ground, enter your vehicle and you can then drive off.

CONTINUOUS WHITE CENTRE LINE -

If a road has a continuous white centre line, there must be 3 metres between the vehicle and the white line.

SCHOOL CROSSINGS -

You cannot stop within **20m of the approach side** or **10m of the departure side** of a school crossing.

SPEED LIMITS -

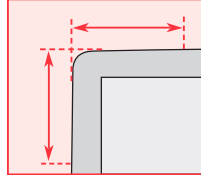
Speeding vehicles in a school zone are highly dangerous for children. There is a **speed limit of 25 kph**, designated by the signs and a zigzag line below, any time when children are present or when the lights are flashing (depending on the type of crossing).



INTERSECTION OR T-INTERSECTION

(Restricted Area)

You cannot park within **10m** of the intersection.



CROSSING PLACES (driveways)

You may park so that the front of your vehicle is level with the approach or the back is level with the departure side of a driveway to any private or public property so that vehicles can enter and depart safely.

FOOTPATHS / NATURE STRIPS -

Parking is prohibited at all times. It creates dangerous situations for both pedestrians and other vehicles in the vicinity.

DOUBLE PARKING -

Creates dangerous situations anytime, however the danger is increased near schools, especially when children are entering or leaving school.

WHY ARE CHILDREN AT RISK

- Their size means that sometimes they cannot easily see or be seen in traffic.
- Parked vehicles, light poles and other street furniture all block a child's view of the road and also make it difficult for drivers to see them.
- Their concentration is limited and they are easily distracted.
- Their actions are often spontaneous and unthinking (that's why they will dart out on to the road to fetch a ball or weave about when riding their bikes) without checking to see if vehicles or pedestrians are coming.
- Their sight is not fully developed, especially their ability to "scan" for things.
- They are lacking the ability to estimate the speed of vehicles, the gap between vehicles, where a vehicle is coming from or how far away it is.

HOW YOU CAN HELP YOUR CHILDREN

FOR UNDER 5 YEARS

Make sure your children have reliable supervision at all times when in or near traffic, especially when crossing roads.

FOR 5 TO 8 YEARS

Help your children to become familiar with all aspects of the road environment – signs, traffic lights and crossing places.

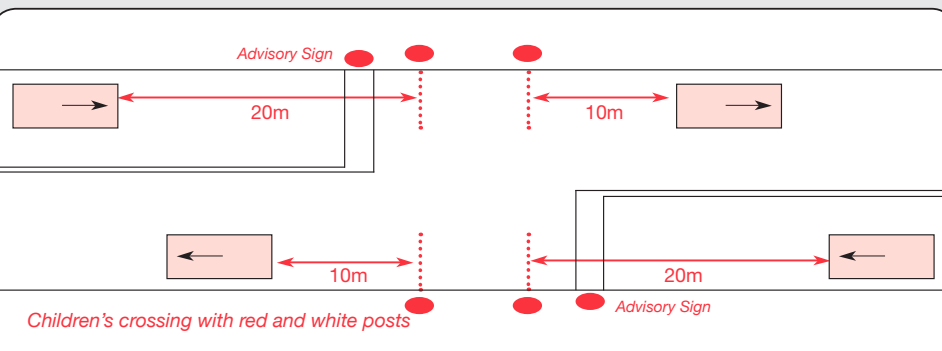
Teach them cycling skills in a safe area – in a park or playground etc.

If they are riding a bike to school, plan a safe route for them to take

Take the time to explain the road rules in simple terms e.g.: Right of way, what to do at intersections etc.

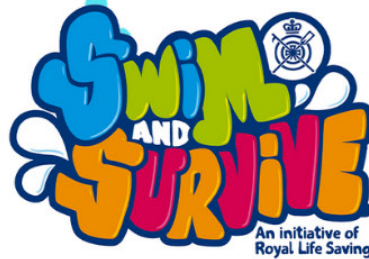
