### **From the Principal**

I am happy to report that this term we have not been swamped with the large numbers of COVID cases which plagued us at the end of Term 1. Thank you to everyone who has adjusted their lives to cope with the COVID routines. I also thank families for applying the same 'stay at home' routines for influenza and not returning to school until symptoms have ceased.

Term 2 has seen more and more students return to the courts and fields for School Sport. Congratulations to students and their successes as reported in this Newsletter. It is also great to see so many of our students being nominated for state teams and heading off interstate for national championships.

The Year 12 Formal is a significant milestone in the calendar as

it marks the half way point for the Year 12 school year. 

### Dr Lowitja O'Donoghue AC CBE DSG

From the outside, it appears it was the young Lowitja's positive attitude to education and advancement, in spite of big obstacles, that helped pave the way for her brilliant future.

Lowitja O'Donoghue was born on August 1, 1932, at Indulkana in remote north-west South Australia. She was the fifth child of her mother Lily and her father Tom O'Donoghue. Lily was an Aboriginal woman of the Pitjantjatjara tribe. Tom O'Donoghue was a stockman of Irish descent. Lowitja was baptised by a pastor from the United Aborigines Mission. Aged just two, she and two of her sisters were taken away by Baptist missionaries on behalf of South Australia's Aboriginal Protection Board to Oodnadatta. Re-named "Lois", she did not see her mother again for 33 years. Her mother did not know where she had been taken. She never met her father.

It was this removal from her family that made Lowitja part of what is known as the Stolen Generations. From Oodnadatta she and others were moved to the Colebrook Home for children run by the Mission.

"I didn't like it of course," O'Donoghue has said. "Particularly when we were told when we went in there that our culture was of the devil. Because I heard that too many times I became quite rebellious."

In 1944 the Colebrook Home moved to Eden Hills in Adelaide. It was whilst living here that she attended Unley High School.

At Unley she applied herself to her studies. According to one source she gained her Intermediate Certificate (Year 10) and was taught to Leaving Certificate standard (Year 11) but did not sit the state examination. This was a time when it was far from routine for all students, particularly girls – particularly Aboriginal girls - to complete all years of school education.

At 16, O'Donoghue got her first job, as a nanny with a family in Victor Harbour. Attending the Baptist Church there, she was encouraged to work as a nursing aide at the local hospital, which she did. This was already noteworthy advancement.

Later she applied to study nursing at the Royal Adelaide Hospital - and was rejected. For five years she fought against this decision, her first battle for Aboriginal rights. In 1954 she was accepted. She became the first Aboriginal woman to train as a nurse at the Royal Adelaide Hospital.

The progression in her life and career from this point was remarkable and included time working as a nurse for the Baptist Overseas Mission in India, where she became aware of the plight of other indigenous cultures. Her drive, determination and vision for her people took her far.







### Dr Lowitja O'Donoghue AC CBE DSG

Over the decades that followed her roles included, among others with non-government organisations:

- Member of the Aboriginal Legal Rights movement, 1970-1972.
- Aboriginal liaison officer with the SA Department of Education.
- Welfare officer with the SA Department of Aboriginal Affairs, based in northern SA.
- Director of the SA Department of Aboriginal Affairs.
- Regional Director of the Federal Department for Aboriginal Affairs.
- Chairperson of the Aboriginal Development Commission.
- In 1990, founding Chairperson of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Commission (ATSIC).
   O'Donoghue had married Gordon Smart in 1979. After her retirement she became "Lowitja". Today she is a Yunkunytjatjara woman.

Her honours and awards have been numerous, including -

- Australian of the Year in 1984.
- First Aboriginal woman to be made a Member of the Order of Australia (AO).
- First Aboriginal Australian to address the United Nations General Assembly.
- In 1999 awarded the Companion of the Order of Australia (AC).
- Patron of the Lowitja Institute, founded in 2010.

In September last year, O'Donoghue was awarded an honorary doctorate from the University of Adelaide for her "lifetime contribution to the advancement of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander rights, leading to significant outcomes in health, education, political representation, land rights and reconciliation." She has honorary doctorates from five Australian universities.

Unley High School is honoured to call Dr O'Donoghue an Old Scholar and to have a school House in her name. **Stephen Murphy**


### ART CLUB

### THE UPCOMING GENERATION: EARTH'S ERADICATION···

Human impact is literal and the actions that proceed from now are crucial. Currently, our present and previous generations have contributed to awful and growing issues. Only now if measures are taken to reverse our mistakes will we have the opportunity to salvage Earth. This section will focus on human-influenced tragedies and how our generation can reverse them.



Society has converted towards manufactured advertising, developing promotional packaging fabricated with plastic. Our generation has been distributing unsustainable packaging in the preponderance of products. Plastic is perpetual and breaking down is a prolonged operation. Furthermore, plastic extracts toxic chemicals when burned. It also contaminates the ocean, erredicating oceanic species and their habitats. This results in consumption and then blocking digestion. ### CHANGE THE DATE; CELEBRATING THE RESILIENCE OF FIRST NATION AUSTRALIANS····

While for many Lanuary 26th is a day of family celebrations, beach cricket and barbeques, for the nearly 800,000 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians it can be a day of overwhelming sadness, frustration, and a reminder of the generational trauma experienced by First Nations people.



January 26, 1788, Captain Cook arrived in Sydney Harbour aboard the first English fleet, bringing with him centuries of mistreatment and oppression that saw nearly 403 massacres of over 10,000 Indigenous Australians in what was known as the Frontier Wars. This bloody and brutal genocide has defined the arguments that support changing Australia Day to Invasion day (or Survival day) for decades. And rightfully so; these horrific events institutionalised systemic racism and prejudice into Australian courts, parliaments and police academies. They have led to injustices and oppressive inequalities in education, healthcare and employment.

However, there is still another rarely considered argument in this debate: if we are to truly recognise Aboriginal and Tomes Strait Islander sovereignty, we must look beyond the events of the past few centuries and acknowledge the phenomenal strength, ingenuity and resilience of the oldest surviving culture on earth. Exclusively defining Australian History from 1788 to the present day makes us no better than the first white invaders who tried so hard to suppress and anglicise the cultural identity of Indigenous Australia. To quote Trials, a Ngarrindjeri musician from A.B. Original, "If a holiday that started 80 years ago is more important than acknowledging and respecting the people that were here over 60,000 years ago and their position on it, then we've still got a long way to go."



The Change the Date protests are more than just efforts to acknowledge the oppression, dispossession, and genocide of Aborginal and Torres Strait Islander people, although this is a vital movement towards justice. They are also about celebrating the strength, resilience and survival of First Nations people, and building a future of acknowledgement, learning and reconciliation. Changing the date is only the first step.

The Winter Olympics have been exhilarating with Norway in number one with 16 gold medals, 8 silvers and 13 bronze medals. Australia came 18th with 1 gold medal, 2 silvers and a bronze medal. Australian freestyle skier Jakarta Anthony won the gold medal for women's moguls on the 6th of February. A great day for her and she's made her country proud. The Winter Paralympics also finished with China on top of the table with 18 gold medals, 20 silver medals and 23 bronze medals. Australia only got 1 bronze medal in the men's snowboard cross. Our bronze medalist being Ben Tudhope, we should all be proud of him and all our Olympic athletes.



It's been a riveting UCL this year with outcomes that are unexpected or just amazing. In the round of 16 first leg, there were mostly draws between Bayern and Salzburg, Manchester United and Athleticio, Villameal and Juventus and Ajax and Bernfeca, but with all those draws, Manchester City smashed Sporting 5-0, securing their spot in the quarter finals. Yet the round of 16 leg 2 is when it really gets interesting. Real Madrid beat PSG 3-1 bringing the aggregate to 3-2, knocking out PSG and bringing Real Madrid to the quarter finals. This is interesting because PSG is said to be one of the best teams in the world, winning 9 Ligue 1 cups (the French league) and an astonishing 14 Coupe de France, which is where there is competition between French teams. Bayern absolutely smashed Salzburg 7-1 with the main man, Robert Lewadoski, scoring a hat-trick. An amazing win for Bayern. Also, Villerreal beat Juventus 3-0, very unexpected as Juventus is one of the best Italian teams. The teams in the quarter finals are Bayern, Liverpool, Manchester City, Real Madrid, Atletico Madrid, Benfica, Villarreal and Chelsea.

Australia vs Pakistan is coming down to the wire as this is the last test match but neitherside has wona match. The last two test matches have been a draw so this is the last test match to get a point. Australia decided to bat first. By the start of April, Australia was 232/5 with Aussie legend Usman Khawaja scoring 91 runs. Usman Khawaja has become a legend; making over 90 runs in every test, he's been amazing. In the second test, in Australia's first innings, he scored 160. Hopefully he can make as many runs in this test. Pakistan's Shaheen Afridia and Nauman Ali had taken two wickets each, and Sajid Khan taking Usman Khawaja. After this test match there will be three ODI's (One Day International) which is where eachside will play 50 overs each.

PHOTOGRAPHY

Year 11 Photography at Unley High school, year after year, provides students with ample opportunities to be creative and of course, learn and develop old and new techniques. The subject is also offered for year 10 students, however year 11 naturally further builds on the skills that have been learned. Using prior knowledge has allowed my class to create striking photos. Here are some descriptions or examples of year 11 photography, to provide a deeper insight to students who are considering the path.



A way of displaying our photographs is by using contact sheets. They are made on Adobe Lightroom, and allow for photos to be organised or observed for different purposes. With most new photography techniques learned, it is initially difficult to get the hang of. To show progress and different ways of snapping the photos, while attempting said technique, contact sheets give a linear step through the shots. Contact sheets are required on almost all assignments or 'photography folios' to show our progress, and to display our understanding.



At times, when a digital camera is not accessible, a mobile phone camera at home is used for assignments. Of course, a digital camera is encouraged foremost, and the classes are allowed to borrow cameras with permission and reason. The photograph of the glittery, gold eye was taken using an iPhone 13 camera, as well as the photo of the lip gloss. The photograph of the lilac coloured flowers side by side, was a 'proper' camera. In both, composition techniques and/or varying camera settings have been used to achieve certain effects. Techniques such as 'point of view', 'close up', 'focal point', and 'rule of thirds' have been used.


