From the Principal

Welcome to the July newsletter.

Students and teachers are heading into a much earned winter break. When we return next term students will be met with a ranges of changes to their school day.

Firstly, the Education Department Policy of 'Phones off and away' begins in earnest from day one in Term 3. If a phone is brought to school, it must be kept in the locker and not accessed till after school. This means all lockers need a secure lock. Congratulations to the Year 11 Music students, Drumline and Jazz Combo for their fabulous performances at the recent Year 11 Soiree held in the Performing Arts Centre on 7 June.

The Year 11 students each presented 2 pieces of solo repertoire to their peers, families and invited guests. The soloists' performances were of an incredibly high standard and were the realisation of some very long-term goals. The levels of musicianship and technique demonstrated reflected the students' dedication, persistence, critical analysis skills and courage. Learning an instrument and performing to a high standard takes years of individual practice, resilience and determination, so I hope the Year 11 music students will acknowledge their individual achievements and feel encouraged and supported to continue their learning journeys into Stage 2 Music in 2024.

The Drumline, our school's premier percussion ensemble directed by **Mr Ryan Grunwald** (Private Music Instructor) also performed 3 pieces:

These repertoire choices treated the audience to a masterclass in the diversity of percussion instruments and both the excitement and beauty of them in combinations. The Year 9 and 11 percussionists performed on a massive array of instruments including snare drums, tom toms, floor tom, xylophone, vibraphone, glockenspiel, malletkat (keyboard percussion synthesiser – timpani and marimba functions), drumkit, wind chimes, triangle, cymbals, woodblocks, tone blocks and more!





Mr Grunwald and I would like to acknowledge and thank Mr Tim Robinson, a senior Maths teacher at Unley High School for his regular involvement and performances with this ensemble. He has shared with us that he enjoys playing in ensemble, and his focus, performance skills and experience were evident at this concert.

The final group to perform at the soiree was the **Jazz Combo**, a Year 9-12 ensemble, led and directed by Year 10 Peter Morrison. This music ensemble is a recent brainchild of some of our senior music students who wanted to develop their knowledge and skills in improvisation and the jazz genre. Peter, a highly skilled young jazz musician offered his expertise to the group, arranging charts and leading the weekly lunchtime rehearses in 2023. Their soiree performance was a tribute to Peter's vision, and the groups' respect for him and their collective goals.

This marks the achievement of a long-term goal for the UHS Music team and ensemble directors, and sets Unley amongst the highest standard DfE secondary music programs in the state.

Year 12 Drama






Bravo! Bravo!























Stories from the Archive

George Cresswell Hall – snapshots across 50 years

For the last in our short series of "then and now" photos, we're going back exactly 50 years – to 1973.

During that year someone had the brilliant idea of taking a photo of a school assembly in the George Cresswell Hall from the stage. It was a time when such things were permitted.

Among other places, the photo was published across the two centre pages of the 1973 Yearbook. (See photo)

We can see a few differences between the Hall's interior in 1973 and 2023... for example, the back wall has changed, there's now an air conditioning system below the ceiling and the lighting is different.

Unley High School had waited for decades for its own Hall, and it was used constantly.

Assemblies in our then new Hall were much more frequent but shorter and less formal. In a time before the internet, they were a key means to routinely disseminate information to the whole school.

It seems some of the original four-seat sets, which everyone was sitting on in the 1973 photo, are still there today, re-upholstered from a mustard colour to blue.

1973 was the last year classes at Unley were named by their streams – for example, 1A, 2B, 3C, etc., state public high school then consisting of First to Fifth Year.

Sitting in the front row on the left in the "then" photo are some super bright kids from 3A. I was in 3C, three rows back. The following year classes were named by year level and room number, for example, 417.

Significant new items received


The Unley High School Archive has received wonderful new donations in recent weeks.


Thank you to Kathleen Brockhoff for the donation of three more Boyd family items to the Unley High School Archive. They are:
