OLIPHANT SCIENCE AWARDS 2023

The Oliphant Science Awards are run each year by the South Australian Science Teachers Association (SASTA) and named after Sir Mark Oliphant, a former Scientist and Governor of SA who also attended Unley High School as a student.

- The Oliphant Science Awards recognise outstanding student work, with prizes for each age group in different science categories. Students have an opportunity to explore their interests in science using a wide range of skills such as computing, writing, photography and creative thinking.
- Competition categories are for Year 7-8, Year 9-10 and Year 11-12.
- There are 10 different science categories crystal growing, scientific inquiry, inventions & models, multimedia, computer applications, games, posters, science writing, photography and Citizen Science.

Unley High School was successful in the Defence Science & Technology Group winning 1st Prize in the Secondary School category in Years 11 and 12.

Students from Unley High School were once again successful in a range of categories this year.

Melson Shi received the Department for Education Young Scientist Award in the Secondary School Category. His Scientific enquiry, 'The Triboelectric Effect' has been selected for the National Awards.

Melson won 1st Prize for his scientific enquiry 'The Triboelectric Effect' in the Year 11-12 category and was also the 1st Prize winner in the Multimedia category with 'The foundation of all Music as we know it' and highly commended for his Photography entry.

First Place in the Year 9-10 Crystal investigation section went to year 10 student **Mariah Kollakombil** for her investigation, 'How temperature effects crystal growing'. She was highly commended for her Year 7-12 crystal investigation on a National level.

In the Year 8 Category, **Ari Llewelyn** was awarded First Prize for his Crystal Investigation, 'The water bath will give more larger and clear crystals', and **Umar Mateen** was awarded 2nd Prize for his Crystal Investigation 'The Crystal will grow 9mm in 3 weeks time'.

Mishka Tripati came 3rd in the Year 7-8 Science Writing category with, 'Mysteries of the Universe'.

Arlo Heinson in year 7 was highly commended for his photography of 'invasive species'.

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A century ago, the whole record of a student's time at Unley consisted of a single card, about the size of an A4 sheet of paper, which was divided into four sections and was folded in half. The fields

on the card to be completed, in handwriting of course, reveal a great deal about those times.

Class Teacher's Initials

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The card allowed space for four years of results only, not five, while each term consisted of three terms, not four. Subjects that students could take included not only timeless staples like Maths I and II, Physics and Chemistry, but Latin, Book-keeping, Shorthand, Typewriting and Domestic Arts.

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The student's "special qualities" were recorded, such as "qualities of leadership", "habits of industry and punctuality", "personality and disposition", "personal deportment and neatness" and "speech".

As 'recently' as 50 years ago on the enrolment card the new student was instructed to – "Underline any of the following that apply to you:- Glasses, colour-blind, defective hearing, left-handed, lame, speech impediment, nerves, fits, asthma, hay fever, adenoids, tonsil trouble, catarrh, persistent cough, frequent headaches." Yes, being left-handed was considered a "handicap".

At the end of a term the student's teachers penned their comments. It could be "Excellent" (as on the card pictured), or it could be less flattering: "Not up to standard" ... "Extravert with no great ability" ... "Lazy and inattentive. Needs a firm hand"... "Lazy, evasive, cheats, talkative" ... "Not much good at anything".

Outdoor Basketball Courts Arrive in Time to Celebrate Australia in the NBA

This NBA season, there are many Australians suiting up for teams around the association, with some Australians being frontrunners for awards, and others making their debuts and thriving for their respective teams. After a disappointing FIBA World Cup campaign for the Boomers, Duop Reath, the Boomers' starting center, has been signed to a one a year deal for the Portland Trail Blazers. Reath impressed in the World Cup for Australia, averaging 9 points and 3 rebounds over the campaign, with an impressive game against the eventual champions Germany, scoring 16 points and 2 blocks in just 18 minutes.

Other Australians around the NBA include Josh Giddey, who was drafted after playing a year for the Adelaide 36ers in the NBL. Esports is a term used for video game competitions, or video games that are played competitively. These can be all manner of titles and genres, from fighters to RPGs (Role-playing games), in this case they were 'Super Smash Bros Ultimate' and 'Rocket League'.

Smash Bros, or more accurately, Super Smash Bros Ultimate (SSBU) is a 2.5D fighter game, exclusive to Nintendo Switch. It features an extensive list of fighters from multiple different franchises, such as Princess Peach and Yoshi from Mario, Inkling from Splatoon, Ryu from Street Fighter, and even Snake from Metal Gear.



Conversely, Rocket League is a 3D competitive soccer game, where players face off in a 3v3 format, and aim to hit the ball into the opposing goal using their skills, coordination and boosts scattered around the field. Simple as it sounds, its main twist is that the player controls a car, leading to majorly different mechanics and techniques compared to other titles in the soccer genre. Available on all major platforms, it has a titanic skill ceiling and a massive competitive community, similar to Smash Bros. Both games are present in many Esports competitions worldwide.

Held on Friday, Week 5, the 17th of November, One Heart League was a competition at Gleeson College between multiple high schools, including Unley. Aimed at encouraging community connections, engagement, sportsmanship, and future careers between high schools, it was a tournament of Smash Bros and Rocket League, where selected, passionate students went head to head to win fame, glory and MSI (Micro-Star International, a Taiwanese tech company known for their high end products) sponsored gear.

The tournament was split into two areas; the first was a main stage, which included the Rocket League stations and large screens streaming the event, and the second was the main floor, which housed most of the Smash Bros stations. The Smash Bros tournament was in a double elimination format, where competitors faced off in a best-of-three against each other, moving further up a bracket. Logically, the Rocket League tournament instead took a round-robin format, with the six teams present facing each other over the day, and the two with the most wins facing off in the finals at the end of the day.

Unley placed well in the Smash Bros tournament, with many of our participants making it far, even to the semi and quarter-finals, but due to the bracket, many Unley students needed to eliminate each other. Unfortunately, none of us made it to the grand finals; instead we gave a passionate appraisal from the crowd as the finalists gave it their best, making an explosive and fitting end to the event.

Unley did, however, win the Rocket League tournament, with the team of Ash Townsin, Charlie Bassett and Luka Jones taking the trophy. Their final match was against a Gleeson College team, of whom they had closely lost to previously. This wasn't the case in the finals, with the Unley team taking a decisive 2-0 victory (9-1 and 7-3), proving their skill and coordination as a group.

The COVID-19 pandemic has had many global effects on tourism, particularly in Australia, where the industry has been on a slower rebound than most other countries. Even so, with the removal of travel restrictions and tensions with China settling, forecasts made by the Australian Trade and Investment Commission expect tourism to make its way back to pre-pandemic levels by 2025. However, while international tourism arrivals in Australia have decreased, new data reveals that domestic tourism is fast on the rise.



Data shows that average and total spending amounts from domestic tourism are now exceeding that of 2019, which is benefiting many smaller businesses. Within this, domestic tourism trends are also changing, moving away from capital city holidays and towards regional area stays. The Reserve Bank of Australia states, "Travel to regional areas recovered more quickly and fully than travel to capital cities. Regional areas were less affected by lockdowns and liaison suggests that travellers preferred to avoid more densely populated areas. There was also a shift towards driving holidays, which has greatly benefited regions within two or three hours' drive from capital cities."



This highlights the desire for less populated holiday destinations brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic, which has greatly benefited many regional areas. This also highlights that despite the decrease in international travel, a desire to travel locally is having a positive impact on many smaller businesses and locations due to increased profits. Therefore, while the wait for international tourism to return to pre-pandemic continues, people are encouraged to take advantage of the lack of tourists and spend Christmas down under.



😁 🛛 Bushfire Season 2023 to 2024

Australia has been facing a rising concern of bushfires throughout the country, during this fire season. The 2023 to 2024 Australian bushfire season predicts an increased risk of fire throughout regions in Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria, The Northern Territory, and South Australia. This has been a major cause for concern considering bushfires have killed approximately 800 people throughout Australia since 1851, and billions of Australia's animals.



Data released by the Copernicus Climate Change Service found that October has broken the global monthly heat records set in 2019 by 0.4 degrees, where the 2019 heat record was at 49.9 °C. "The record was broken by 0.4 degrees Celsius, which is a huge margin," said C3S Deputy Director Samantha Burgess, who described the October temperature anomaly as "very extreme". An agency statement added that 2023 was "virtually certain" to be the hottest on record in 125,000 years. People who wish to are able to view fires that have occurred throughout Australia on the My Fire Watch website to picture those that have occurred recently.

Communities are being urged to prepare for what is to be expected to be the most significant bushfire season in Australia since the 2019 to 2020 black summer fires. The CFS have provided helpful links to plan ahead and stay prepared: Prepare now by clearing any fire danger objects around your property, pack an emergency kit, and know your closest Bushfire Safer Place. Plan ahead by preparing your 5 minute bushfire plan and share it with your loved ones as well as preparing a plan for all pets and livestock. Finally, stay informed. Check the fire danger rating each day using multiple sources of information in case a fire starts near you. This can include the CFS Incidents & Warnings_website. Stay safe this fire danger season by taking action and planning ahead: "Why risk it? Act now to be bushfire ready."

Recently, a group of frustrated climate change protestors gathered to form a peaceful water blockade at the Newcastle Port. Nearly 1,500 people paddled out in the harbour in kayaks, canoes and paddle boards to participate in the 30 hour long demonstration, preventing an estimated half a million tonnes of coal from leaving. This protest, along with recent 'Fridays for Future' School Strikes, has been part of an increasing national demand for observable and rapid climate action.

Among the protesters were Greens politicians Adam Bandt, Cate Faehrmann and Sue Higginson, along with The Rising Tide Foundation spokesperson Zach Schofield. Although peaceful in nature, 109 people were arrested over the two days, including 5 teens and a 97 year old man.



Over the past decade Australian coal exports have grown over 2.5% at an average annual rate, with a holistic increase of over 8% (from 302 metric tonnes in 2011–12 to over 363 metric tonnes in 2020–21). At the same time the number of scientific papers warning of the horrific effects of fossil fuels has grown nearly exponentially, with the UN Secretary General even declaring it a high priority for humanity's future prospects.

However, despite being some of the highest contributing industries to climate change, the Australian Federal and state governments have provided a total of \$11.1 billion worth of spending and tax breaks to support mining companies this year alone. To put that in perspective, the federal government allocated nearly \$500,000 million dollars less to government schools for the entire year (just \$10.6 billion).



The effects of our warming climate are becoming undeniably obvious, with the devastation of the Lismore and Murryland floods unceasing, and the recent carnage inflicted by the still burning bushfires in Western Australia. Until definite and informed action is taken, such protests will undoubtedly continue to occur on increasingly large scale





😁 丨 Are Saturn's Rings Disappearing?

The majestic rings of the planet Saturn are so intertwined with its general perception that they are nearly impossible to separate. But, in a little over a year, these renowned structures will be absent from the views of stargazers. Fortunately, this isn't a precursor to a drastic planetary event, but rather a simple matter of planetary alignment.



Saturn's rings are in fact extremely thin, possessing a width of approximately one kilometre. And when viewed edge-on, they seemingly vanish. This illusion occurs partly due to the distance between Earth and Saturn, and the alignment between the two.

Upon hearing this news, many keen stargazers were shocked, some to a point they contemplated, "Is this the end of Saturn's rings?". Of course, this was prior to them learning the disappearance was temporary. Delving further into the science behind this phenomenon, we can also learn that this particular alignment between the two planets occurs roughly every 13 to 16 years.

Similar to most planets, as Saturn completes its orbit around the sun, it leans at an angle of 26.7 degrees. This means that the view of Saturn's rings toggles between the upper side of the rings when it's tilted towards us, and the lower side when it's tilted away. For this particular phenomenon to occur, the Earth must transition between these two perspectives, passing through the area known as Saturn's "ring plane" - any area of space in line with the edge of the rings. Additionally, their disappearance is further enhanced by the fact "they reflect very little light when viewed via the ring plane", as remarked by Vahe Peroomian, a professor of physics and astronomy.

Ultimately, the absence of Saturn's majestic rings from the stargazers' view in a little over a year is not a cause for alarm but rather a consequence of a planetary alignment. This alignment is a quite rare phenomenon, one which offers a novel experience for skywatchers. And while their temporary absence may disappoint observers, it serves as a reminder of the unpredictable nature of celestial phenomena and the ever-changing perspectives we have of the universe.

The skill of running has been greatly valued all through history, evolving from the ability of stalking prey, to

transmitting messages in wars and pushing the limits of human physiology. However, it has finally evolved into the unimpeded pinnacle of human physical feats - the marathon.



The marathon originates from the year 490 B.C., where upon defeating opposition Persians in battle, Greek General Miltiade sent his messenger Phidippides from the plains of Marathon all the way to Athens to announce: "Rejoice, we are victorious". The route this brave messenger took was 42.3 kilometres, forming the foundation of the modern day race of 42.2.

We now skip 2,300 years of innovation and evolution to the year 1908, where the British Royal Family proves its definitive influence on anything and everything. It is said that during the preparation for the summer Olympiads, Officials were to include a marathon of "about 40 kilometres or 25 miles". The final course began at Windsor Castle, and finished directly in front of the Royal Box in Olympic stadium, spanning 26 miles and 385 yards, creating the now IAAF (International Association of Athletics Federation official marathon distance.

Albeit, the drama of this race began at the finish, when Dorando Pietri staggered onto the stadium's track, in sight of the finish line where he collapsed several times until he was helped over the line in first place by a compassionate official. This story flooded the media for several days, and although Pietri was disqualified, the commotion that he sparked led to the popularisation of his event which remains prevalent today.

We now skip to October 2019, where Eliud Kipchoge, the GOAT of marathon running took on a remarkable feat of human endurance and athleticism in the "Ineos 1:59"

challenge. Organised by British billionaire Sir Jim Ratcliffe's chemical company, Ineos, the challenge aimed to break the elusive two-hour barrier in the marathon distance.

The challenge was successful, and Kipchoge finished the marathon in an astounding 1:59:40, shocking the world. However, he ran the race in the Nike Vaporfly Next% running shoes, which sparked controversy due to their alleged performance enhancing properties. The run is not classified as an official world record, due to the use of a pacing car, hanging pacers, and hydration delivered via bike. Kipchoge's record is still not to be overlooked, as it is still one of the greatest physical and mental feats ever completed by mankind, forging his name into the history books.

The marathon is a recreational activity that over one million people partake in every year. It is incredible to see how it has changed from a means of survival, to a form of messaging, and finally, to a story of determination, passion, and human endeavour.

PARKING RESTRICTIONS AT SCHOOLS ARE FOR THE SAFETY OF YOUR CHILDREN

Local Councils impose a variety of parking restrictions at and near schools to achieve a safer environment for your children. These restrictions are also to optimise traffic movement and safety.

NO STOPPING ZONES -These zones are usually adjacent ç to school entrances and the approach and departure sides of school crossings. You must not stop your vehicle in a no stopping zone or on a solid yellow line, not even for a few seconds. **NO PARKING ZONES -**You may stop in a No Parking D zone to immediately pick up or set down your child, and drive off as soon as possible. No Parking zones are to ensure a quick and smooth turnover of

You must not leave your vehicle parked or unattended. If you are going to collect your child from this zone, have your child wait nearby in the school grounds so they can see you arrive. On your arrival they can then leave the school ground, enter your vehicle and you can then drive off.

CONTINUOUS WHITE CENTRE LINE -

If a road has a continuous white centre line, there must be 3 metres between the vehicle and the white line.

SCHOOL CROSSINGS -

vehicles.

You cannot stop within 20m of the approach side or 10m of the departure side of a school crossing.

SPEED LIMITS -

Speeding vehicles in a school zone are highly dangerous for children. There is a speed limit of 25 kph, designated by the signs and a zigzag line below, any time when children are present or when the lights are flashing (depending on the type of crossing).



CROSSING PLACES (driveways)

You may park so that the front of your vehicle is level with the approach or the back is level with the departure side of a driveway to any private or public property so that vehicles can enter and depart safely.

FOOTPATHS / NATURE STRIPS -

Parking is prohibited at all times. It creates dangerous situations for both pedestrians and other vehicles in the vicinity.

DOUBLE PARKING -

Creates dangerous situations anytime, however the danger is increased near schools, especially when children are entering or leaving school.

BECAUSE CHILDREN ARE NOT LITTLE ADULTS YOU NEED TO **DRIVE WITH CARE AND CONCENTRATION NEAR SCHOOLS**

WHY ARE CHILDREN AT RISK

- Their size means that sometimes they cannot easily see or be seen in traffic.
- Parked vehicles, light poles and other street furniture all block a child's view of the road and also make it difficult for drivers to see them.
- Their concentration is limited and they are easily distracted.
- Their actions are often spontaneous and unthinking (that's why the will dart out on to the road to fetch a ball or weave about when riding their bikes) without checking to see if vehicles or pedestrians are coming.
- Their sight is not fully developed, especially their ability to "scan" for things.
- They are lacking the ability to estimate the speed of vehicles, the gap between vehicles, where a vehicle is coming from or how far way it is.
