Furniture Construction

Year 12 Furniture (Materials Solutions) brings together 5 years of learning in Design and Technology.

Students are given the task to investigate, design and manufacture an item of furniture suitable for an indoor or outdoor setting.

Students use the design process to come up with an idea which is developed into a product. They research various elements and techniques and look to apply them. Students then produce a drawing using a CAD program to gain insight into what it might look like before they begin manufacturing.

While this looks like a monumental task at the beginning of the course and is often met with 'How are we supposed to do that?', at the end of the year it is a delight to see the pride the students have in what they have achieved and they are all very quick to make sure they take their pride and joy home.

Book Week Activity

In Term 3, our Year 8 students had the exciting opportunity to visit Mitcham Primary School to engage with their younger peers in a meaningful and creative way. As part of this collaborative project, Year 8 students conducted interviews with Year 2 children to gather insights into their interests and reading preferences. This hands-on research formed the foundation for a unique and imaginative assignment: creating picture books based on this year's Book Week theme, Reading is Magic. From writing the stories to illustrating them, our Year 8 students embraced the challenge of creating engaging, age-appropriate books and worked hard to ensure each 'buddy' received a personalised picture book to keep.

In Week 4 of Term 3, Year 8 students returned to Mitcham Primary School to share the books they had created. The interactions between the Year 8 students and the Year 2 children highlighted that the project had a powerful impact, not only fostering stronger connections between the students, but also contributing to the literacy development for all students involved.

As part of the next stage of the project, our Year 8 students will reflect on the creative process through the creation of a Writer's Statement. This will allow them to justify their creative choices, explaining how they tailored their stories to meet the needs and interests of their intended audience. The Writer's Statement will also give students the opportunity to reflect on how this project helped them grow as writers and communicators.

The picture books will soon be sent home with the Year 8 students involved to share with families. We are incredibly proud of our Year 8 students for their dedication and creativity, and we look forward to seeing how this project continues to inspire both our students and the young learners at Mitcham Primary School.




Stories from the Archive Mr Woodward's impact on our school

In the last issue we thanked former teacher Glen Woodward for his generous donation to our Archive of more than 500 items from his years at Unley between 1959 and 1985. These items now form the Glen Woodward Collection within the Unley High School Archive. In this issue, we look at all too briefly at his contribution and legacy.

Glen landed at Unley as a young teacher in late 1959 to teach Geography. He taught junior boys, still at Kyre Avenue. It seems Glen regarded the old campus, where Unley High School had been since 1915, as a bit of an "antique".

Almost immediately his ideas had an impact. It was he who encouraged senior students who were wanting a voice to start the student newspaper, "The Unley Eye". By most measures,

the "Eye" was a massive success, even if controversial at times! At its height the newspaper, costing a few pence or (after 1966) cents, had a circulation of 1200, with 30 mailed to subscribers. Sometimes it would even publish students' interviews with big celebrities. Once the newspaper itself made the front page of "The Advertiser". The "Eye" gained such a standing, old scholars from the time still remember it today. Glen soon made his mark in other ways. In the 1960's he and colleague Graham Smith authored a book, "Australia: A Social Study" which, as the title suggests, was a Social Studies text. Going through several editions, it remained for many years a well-used text for students to Third Year (Year 10) level.



Then in 1968, Glen and colleague Sid Eberhard launched another innovation – a camp for Matriculation (Year 12) students. It was held at Tatachilla in Adelaide's far south, designed to allow socialising and promote thought-provoking discussion. The annual Matric camp at Tatachilla became another Unley institution.

Perhaps the biggest innovation of which Glen was part came in his appointment in the early 1970's as Student Counsellor. Part of the role was vocational guidance. He set up a Careers Room where students could find information about tertiary courses and employment. An important element of Glen's work as Student Counsellor was to make the first Asian and international students feel welcome at the school.

Today that small careers room is the Science Store in the middle wing of the main building. Glen's office was adjacent. In this role he said he was only doing what every teacher would do if they had time.

There was much else also in his quarter-century at Unley, but sadly no space here to elaborate.

The significance of Glen Woodward's contribution and legacy hard to overstate. What stood out was his energy, cheerful disposition and commitment to the students and to the school. Without doubt Glen, known and loved by generations of students as "Mr Woodward", is one of the legends of Unley High School!

Donation from Bill Smith

Another very generous donation has been received from another legend of Unley High School, W.F. (Bill) Smith, a member of staff from 1970 to 1990.

Mr Smith has donated 13 copies of the school magazine, from 1970 to 1982, numerous photos of classes of which he was class teacher as well as other items.

A much respected physics teacher, indeed a Special Senior Master, Mr Smith is remembered today at the school with a plaque now part of a display in Student Services.

Our photo also shows Mr Smith, on the left, as he appeared in the 1970 school magazine. The photo was captioned with the following (note, Tatachilla was the Matriculation or Year 12 camp) -

"Came to Unley from beautiful downtown rural Urrbrae after a harrowing trek across the school paddock in the summer of 1970.

Quiet and much given to physics – dry sense of humour.

His name has rapidly become synonymous with Tatachilla 1970.

When subjected to ultra-violet light in the presence of a beat band of 'x' decibels will gyrate in not-so-simple harmonic motion for the entire evening."

In the 1970's among the student body (of whom I was one), Mr Smith became famous for his handlebar moustache and Mustang car!


The school was pleased to welcome Bill and Bev Smith on a visit on Friday, October 25.

The trees were purchased from the State Flora Nursery situated in Belair National Park, which specialises in growing and selling Australian native plant species.

The Environment and Facilities Action group are extremely proud of this contribution to Adelaide's green canopy, and hope that it inspires both more planting within Unley High School, but also within the greater Adelaide region.




