Context Statement

Unley High School caters for students from 7-12. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2024 is 1599. Unley High School is classified as Category 6 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 1% Aboriginal students, 10% students with disabilities, 10% students with English as an additional language or dialect (EALD) funded background. Governing Council Report

Looking back on 2024, Unley High School has once again achieved numerous successes whilst providing high quality education. School structures are well established to accommodate for the needs of all students from Year 7 to 12 with facilities that cater both for indoor learning and relaxation as well as outdoor spaces for all ages. Student numbers grew from 1550 in 2023 to 1640 in 2024 with the final enrolments once again exceeding forecast growth.

The Unley HS French Bilingual Binational Program continues to grow steadily as students from the French Bilingual program at Highgate School flow onto High School. Sadly, the numbers choosing the International Baccalaureate Diploma Program has not grown sufficiently to maintain a financially viable program, so the difficult decision was made to halt the program. However, students currently enrolled will be supported to complete the two-year diploma in 2025.

Improving Unley HS infrastructure continues to be a focus as the enrolments steadily increase year on year. Governing Council is strongly advocating for further upgrades of the ageing classrooms and will continue to do so to ensure that Unley can provide high quality education in learning spaces that are not just comfortable but also conducive to learning. This year the school canteen was upgraded and divided into two halves. Middle School students have access from the northern-side while Senior School students have access from the southern-side. This has doubled the flow of students through the canteen and greatly reduced waiting time while improving service times.

Academically, UHS students once again performed at exceptional levels with our Year 12 students achieving high results. We congratulate 5 Student's for achieving 5 Merits and 18 students for achieving 23 A+ results. The best improvement was a 2% increase in A&B Grades which doubled the schools SACE Improvement Target for 2024. Also, the SACE Dux of School achieved an ATAR of 98.15 and the IBDP Dux of School achieved an ATAR of 99.95.

As always, Unley HS continues to excel in sport activities with the Pedal Prix Team finishing strong for the season at the 24hr Murray Bridge race. The team of teachers and parent volunteers have done an incredible job supporting the students and raising funds to purchase gear for the team. The UHS rowing team also had a strong performance at the Head of the River Regatta with nine podium finishes which increased from last year's performance with the Year 10 Girls being the standout gold medal crew. UHS students also competed in numerous knock-out competitions across the year including netball, soccer, softball and basketball to name but a few.

I would also like to thank the Student Voice Council and our Head prefects this year for continuing the student initiatives to maintain and increase engagement and involvement by students in organised activities. The student web-based bulletin board proved to be a great means of communicating with all year levels. We are confident that this initiative and others will continue in future years and foster a culture of inclusion and support among students.

UHS staff again remained stable under the leadership of Mr Greg Rolton as Principal especially in light of his reappointment to the position until the end of 2029. The Governing Council recognises his and the leadership team's efforts. Consistency in leadership contributes largely to maintaining a high level of education and support for our students and we are confident that this will continue.

We welcomed new faces to the Governing Council and said farewell to others. It is, as always, heartening to see parent interest in being part of the Governing Council and contributing to the school we hope that this trend will continue for years to come.

The Governing Council would like to thank UHS staff, volunteers and students for their willingness to be a part of the ongoing UHS governance activities and highly value all contributions.



Performance Summary NAPLAN Proficiency



Attendance Comment

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or nongovernment school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.
